TRUCK COLLIDES WITH POLE CAR

Delivery Auto Strikes Trailer of Street Car and Drives Pole Into Dashboard of Motor Car.

NO SERIOUS INJURIES

Driver of Truck Swung Out of the Way of Motorcycle Rider and a Smash Resulted.

A delivery truck belonging to W. B. Daniel and driven by H. Prentz struck a pole car on the Main street line this morning near Twelfth and Main street. One of the poles was driven into the dash board of the motor car pulling the trailer, and the driver of the delivery truck sustained a bruised arm in the accident.

The street car and trailer with the poles was standing on the tracks near Twelfth street. A. C. Anderson, master mechanic for the company had just flagged the car to arrange for the transfer of some of the men and the poles, and was coming across the track on his motorcycle to get around on the right hand side of the car.

The Daniel truck was coming down Main street at about twenty-five miles an hour, car company employees said, and the driver put on his brakes to keep from hitting the motorcycle. The truck struck one of the poles and drove it into the dashboard of the motor car, and bent it in.

The front wheel of the truck was damaged and the driver sustained a bruised arm. A passenger in the truck who made his getaway right after the smash, was not injured.

Anderson swung over to the curb when he saw the truck coming down on him, and the impact of the collision between the truck and the pole car swerved the truck across the tracks to the other side of the street.

REMARKABLE ALFALFA GROWN AT SANDUSKY

Elmer Smith Grows Plant to Height of Three Feet—Much Superior to Average Stand.

A remarkable stand of alfalfa is on exhibition at The Gate City office. The alfalfa was grown by Elmer Smith of Sandusky. Mr. Smith lives on the Carpenter farm.

The plant is nearly three feet high. It is of luxuriant growth. Purple blossoms bloom in abundance at the top. Alfalfa usually grows to about half the height of this stand. It is seldom so luxuriant in growth. This grown by Mr. Smith seems to justify all that has been claimed for the plant by agricultural experts over the country.
