MONTROSE FARMER PAINFULLY INJURED

Louis Schheld Run Over by Buggy and Dragged on Pavement When Horse Ran Away.

Louis Schheld, 63 years old, a farmer, living between Montrose and Argyle, was painfully injured when his horse ran away about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Schheld was receiving a load of potatoes at Eighth and Main streets. He was standing beside his spring wagon, holding the reins. Suddenly the horse broke into a run, frightened by a passing automobile. In attempting to check the animal, Mr. Schheld was dragged under the wheels. One wheel passed over him. He still clung to the lines, hoping to stop the horse, and was dragged nearly a hundred feet, when C. Keppel ran into the street and stopped the horse. Mr. Schheld was badly bruised. His nerves were also severely shaken. For a time, it was feared that he had sustained internal injuries. He was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, where he was given treatment by Dr. W. P. Sherlock. He was able to leave the hospital and go to Montrose this afternoon.

WANT TO REPEAL IOWA PRIMARY LAW

Lee County Republicans in Session This Morning at Port Madison, Call it a Failure.

ENDORSE CANDIDATES

Hughes, Fairbanks, Kennedy, Harding and All State and County Nominees, Pledged Support.

FORT MADISON, Iowa, July 1.—The republican county convention which convened here this morning, demanded the repeal of the state primary election law. The resolutions adopted ordered the Lee delegates to work to secure a plank in the platform against this primary law. It is claimed in the resolutions that the primary has failed in its provisions and that it has heaped expense on the people.

The Lee republicans endorsed the candidacy of Hughes and Fairbanks, C. A. Kennedy for congress, and W. L. Harding for governor. All of the county and state candidates on the republican ticket received the unqualified endorsement of the Lee convention.

The following delegates were chosen to the state convention at Des Moines:

C. A. Kennedy of Montrose, Frank Hughes of Washington, F. C. Tabor of Donnellson, G. W. Mattern of Donnellson, W. G. Blood, Stephen Irwin, John C. Scott, W. R. Kendrick, H. I. Sawyer, Fred Overton, all of Keokuk; A. P. Brown, R. A. Gardner, T. P. Hollowell and George B. Stewart of Fort Madison, and D. A. King of West Point.

The resolutions committee, composed of John C. Scott, Stephen Irwin, A. P. Brown and R. A. Gardner brought in the resolutions. The resolutions enthusiastically endorse the candidacy of Charles E. Hughes and Charles W. Fairbanks for president and vice president; the platform endorsed by the republican convention; the candidacy of Charles A. Kennedy and the support of the party to return him to the office he has so ably filled; the candidacy of W. L. Harding for governor and the
