RUBBISH PILE FIRE QUICKLY EXTINGUISHED

Blaze on River Front Below the Taber Mill Did Little Damage Before Fire Department Arrived. Little damage was done by a blaze in the rubbish pile below the Taber mill, about 6:30 yesterday afternoon. The fire department promptly responded to a still alarm, and extinguished the flames with the chemical engine. The rubbish heap along the river front at this point is composed of sawdust, and scraps of wood, accumulated during the many years of the sawmill industry. Had the flames once burned well below the surface of the pile, the fire would have burned for weeks, as it would be practically impossible to extinguish a fire in such material, once it became well started.
