COUNTY AGENT PLAN GAINS

Sheriff Scott of Keokuk is one of the men interested in the employment of man.

A movement to form a Lee county Soil Improvement and Agricultural association is now on foot in Fort Madison and throughout the county, says the Fort Madison Gem City.
 The ultimate plan of the move is the employment of a county agent. A meeting will be called of all interested parties in the movement at this city soon for the purpose of launching the project. Local men are promoting the scheme but will request the aid of certain residents of other cities and towns of the county who would lend their assistance towards the move. Keokuk will be asked to aid in the formation of the association.

Some of the men behind the big movement are Roy C. Smith, W. R. Timpe and H. A. Skyles of this city and Sheriff John Scott of Keokuk. Most of these men have had practical experience in farming, while Mr. Smith is known to be an enthusiast in such movements, as it was practically through his work and efforts that Henry county secured its agent. A county agent was employed there under some opposition on the part of many. Now those who opposed the move, more through ignorance, are the greatest supporters of the county agent and his work. The soil expert in that county is the light of miracles, but which merely are the results of science.
 The county is greatly in need of a county agent if nothing more than through the variety of the soils and the insurance against plagues among the stock.

MANY TAKE OUT HUNTING LICENSE

Between Four and Five Hundred Have Been Issued in Lee County Alone—Open Season on Many Birds.

GAME THAT CAN BE SHOT

Hunters Warned to Have Their Licenses With Them When Out—Must Not Ship Game Out of State.

Between four and five hundred hunting licenses have been issued this season in Lee county at Keokuk and Fort Madison.

Now that the open season on several kinds of game is here, no doubt local hunters will be flocking to the woods on the fine September days that are coming.

Hunters have been warned to carry their licenses with them as receipts will not be recognized.

What Can Be Taken.

Here is some of the game that can be shot now or in the near future:
 Native grouse and prairie chickens until December 1.
 Woodcock until January 1.
 Ruffed grouse, pheasants, wild turkeys and quail from November 1 to December 15.
 Wild ducks, geese, brant, rail, plover, sandpipers and marsh or beach birds until April 15.
 Gray fox, or timber squirrels until January 1.
 Beaver, mink, otter and muskrat from December 1 to April 1.

There are restrictions on the number of each of the foregoing birds and animals that can be shot and also on the manner in which they can be taken and hunters should make it a point to secure a copy of the Iowa fish and game laws so that they do not make themselves liable to prosecution.

The law is especially stringent on the shipment of game out of the state. The game books read as follows on this point: "It is illegal to ship any of the birds or animals herein referred to, out of the state, and in shipping from one point to another in the state, certain conditions are prescribed which must be carefully complied with."

The Lacy Act.

Game Warden Henry F. Reichmann today received a letter relating to this very point, from C. F. Amuth, inspector of interstate commerce in game, in which he offers assistance in prosecuting persons who ship game from one state to another in violation of the Lacy act. The cases will be prosecuted in the federal courts.

DYNAMITER IS ON TRIAL

Man Accused of Setting Off Bomb During Preparedness Parade in San Francisco.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Sept. 12.

—When the trial of Warren K. Billings, accused of murder in connection with San Francisco's preparedness parade dynamiting, was resumed today in the court of Superior Judge Hunt, it appeared certain that the jury would be completed and opening arguments would be made before adjournment tonight. There were eleven takers in the box, passed tentatively by both sides, but it was expected that peremptory challenges would be exercised on some of these.

After one of the physicians present at the autopsy on the body of Mrs. Myrtle VanLoon, a bomb victim, is called to establish the corpus delicti, the trial of Billings on charge of causing Mrs. VanLoon's death will proceed. Much testimony withheld at the perfunctory examination at the inquest will be given in full.
