LEE TEACHERS TO MEET HERE

County Institute Will be Held in Keokuk Thursday and Friday, September 28 and 29.

PROGRAM IS ARRANGED

County Superintendent Lynn Has This Feature in Charge—Attendance is Compulsory.

The annual Lee County Teachers' institute will be held in Keokuk Thursday and Friday, September 28 and 29, with sessions at the Keokuk high school. The teachers from all over Lee county will assemble here on these dates for special conferences and to listen to some of the best of the educational leaders of the country tell about the work.

There will be two night sessions of the institute, one on Wednesday and the other on Thursday. Both of these will be interesting and will have some special features.

This institute takes the place of the one formerly held in the summer time. The institute was held in Keokuk two years ago, and in Fort Madison last year. The attendance on the sessions of the institute are compulsory on the rural teachers and on all teachers where school is dismissed for the sessions. It is probable that the local schools will be dismissed during the sessions of the institute.

War Orphan Adopted.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The bright smile of a little blue eyed incubator baby at Atlantic City won its way to the heart of Mrs. Richard Elkins, whose husband is the youngest son of the late Senator Elkins, of West Virginia, it became known today, and the newly christened baby is now known as John Gerard Lonesdale.

The baby, a "war orphan," whose father died in the trenches in Flanders, and whose mother died shortly after his birth, was placed in an incubator at Coney Island and later transferred to Atlantic City.

There Mrs. Elkins became interested in the little mite and obtained permission to adopt it. The baby was given her family name.

Two Steamers Sunk.

WARLIKE TONE BY THE QUEEN

Regent of Holland Says Her Country is Ready and Eager to Keep Neutral.

She told parliament that important steps to strengthen the Dutch forces to resist any attack on the country's neutrality are being taken and that the supply of war materials and munitions is growing. She warned Belgians on both sides that Holland is prepared to resist such an attack.
