#### CITY NEWS.

—The city council has ordered fire hydrants placed at the intersections of I street and Missouri avenue and J and Oak streets in Mason's lower addition. The last hydrant in this part of town is at K and Missouri streets and when the new ones are put in fire protection will be extended several hundred yards.

—In an effort to protect housewives from peddlers who, it is charged, have been giving short measure, the Iowa state food and dairy commission today issued the following table of weights with the suggestion that purchases be weighed in every case. The commission gives the following table for the convenience of the purchasers: Apples, per bushel, 48 pounds; beets, 56 pounds; carrots, 50 pounds; corn meal, 48 pounds; onions, 52 pounds; dried peas, 60 pounds; sweet potatoes, 50 pounds; turnips, 55 pounds. Inspectors for the commission throughout the state are keeping peddlers under surveillance, endeavoring to detect violations of the state law providing for the use of standard weights in the sale of commodities.

#### TO GIVE EXAMS NEXT TUESDAY

Applicants for War Department Jobs Will Have Opportunity to Pass Tests Then.

Examinations will be given here Tuesday, September 26, to secure eligibles for the war department jobs which are open. Male stenographers and typewriters only are eligible to the examinations. If any one from Keokuk is contemplating taking the tests he should make his application at once. The examination will be conducted by the civil service board here, and applications for the entry blanks should be made to Miss Lillian M. Perkins at the local postoffice.
