



—Hens don't stop scratching because worms are scarce; neither do we; my New York buyer ships us new suits, dresses, waists, dailies, Lowitz. Visit the busy \$1.00 waist, housedresses and children's dress department.

—Keokuk merchants should not fail to make their best showing during Dress-Up Week, September 25 to 30, and the people of the surrounding country should not fail to visit the city during Dress-Up Week and see the latest fall fashions.

—Dress-Up Week is a nation-wide movement. Keokuk will be listed with the other live cities taking part in this event. The Keokuk Dress-Up week dates are September 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30. And advertising copy for this event should be placed in the hands of the printer several days before time of appearance so that proof can be shown and advertisements set more attractively.

—The Nauvoo grape season closed yesterday and today. The harvest for this year is one of the smallest gathered here in recent years, says the Nauvoo Independent. The Grape Growers' association shipped about twenty-three car loads, B. Baxter's sons, eighteen and Dachroth & Hart, seventeen. This makes a total of fifty-eight cars. The usual crop is 100 to 150 car loads. Grapes are now being cut for wine. The chances are that much wine will be made in Nauvoo this year.

—Rev. Dr. J. W. Wilson delivered another of his most interesting sermons to a fair sized attendance at Pilgrim's Rest Baptist church last evening. Devotional services were conducted from 7:30 until 8 p. m., after which Dr. Wilson spoke from the subject, Dry Bones in the Valley. He will preach again tonight at the same hour. The public is invited to attend this service. Dr. Helm who went to Bevlers, Mo., to attend a state district board meeting of which he is moderator, is expected home some time today.

—C. H. Petah of St. Paul and H. S. Payne of Fort Madison were in Nauvoo yesterday and Mr. Petah announced at a meeting of the directors of the proposed Nauvoo-Fort Madison interurban line, that he has arranged to get the capital to build the road, the Nauvoo Independent says. He will put up his bond in a few days. The directors, J. M. Fisher, Fred Salm Jr., and A. J. Berger, all unite in saying that Petah has done his part. If the people between Nauvoo and Fort Madison meet him with a \$55,000 subscription, the road will be built. The soliciting of subscriptions will commence soon.

—As much meat is consumed annually in the Iowa state prison at Fort Madison as is utilized in many of the smaller cities. Advices have been received that the board of contract at Des Moines has contracted for the receiving of 81,600 pounds of meat for the penitentiary. A total of 25,600 pounds of pork will be received while 56,000 pounds of beef has also been contracted for consumption in the institution. Some of the meat is also raised by the state on the prison farm near the city which cuts down the amount contracted for use at the prison here.

—There is a distinct loss that cannot be avoided when display advertisements do not reach this paper the morning of the day before insertion. —Few of those who play tennis are aware of the fact that the American dog is now playing a part in the production of tennis racquets. Until last year tennis strings were made wholly of sheep gut, the entrails of the hog being shipped to Germany in large quantities for use as sausage casings. When the war closed the American market, American manufacturers of necessity used their sheep gut to produce surgical gut and musical strings, while the surplus of hog gut was, and is now being converted into tennis strings, which, according to an expert, compare favorably with the sheep gut when the material is sound and the strings properly made.


