GIANTS HAVE WON TWENTY-ONE GAMES

New York Team Establishes New Major League Record for Consecutive Victories.

STARTED SPURT SEPT. 7

McGraw's Men Will Meet Cardinals This Afternoon in an Effort to Make Run of Twenty-two.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Having established a new major league record by winning twenty-one consecutive games, the New York Giants, or brand new Giants, will meet St. Louis this afternoon in an effort to make that run twenty-two.

Defeating the Cardinals yesterday in a double header, McGraw's new team made history by beating the feat of the famous "rovidence team" of 1884, which won twenty straight games.

The Giants started their great spurt September 7, against the Dodgers, with Ferdinand Schupp, who pitched the twentieth victory yesterday, in the box. On September 9, 13, 14, 15, 19, 23 and 25 they won two games in a single day, included in their string of victories were the Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Chicago and St. Louis clubs.

Perritt, who climbed to fame by winning two games from the Phillies on September 9, won six of the contests. Schupp won five and Tesreau the same number.

The feat of the Giants is made all the more remarkable by their record earlier in the season, when they won seventeen straight games.

Tinker Will Pay Honest Debt In Beating Dodgers

Another Ghost of Long Ago Discovered By Manager Ebbets Himself

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Another writhing hand with the staling ghost of the Federal league at Ebbets field today and joined the dance through which Joe Tinker hopes to jostle the Dodgers away from a pennant, and world's series honors and cash.

Charles H. Ebbets himself discovered this one. His mind turned back to 1908 when the Phillies wrecked Giant pennant hopes to the advantage of the Cubs. Tinker was grateful along with other members of the Chicago machine, so if he can beat the Dodgers now he'll be repaying an honest debt, as the Dodger president sees it.

No Joke for Dodgers.

But the ghost dance on Ebbets field has gotten to the point where it is no joke for the Dodgers. They must face the Cubs again today with their lead over the Phillies out to a bare game. Another defeat for the Brooklynites and a victory for the Phillies will put the Pat Morans in first place. Their edge will be a single point, but then will come the struggle of the year when the two teams meet face to face for a three game series, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Something has to drop in this series and the Dodgers are fighting to the limit to hold what they have now. Following this mix up, the Dodgers have to take on the ripping, tearing Giants who are out after a consecutive victory record that will stand for years. The Phillies will have the faltering Braves on hand during the same period.

This means that no matter what

happens in Brooklyn during the latter part of this week, the championship may finally be decided in the Giant-Dodger games.

Then will come a test of sentiment with a reverse English to that now being exhibited on Ebbets field. There is no one John McGrath would rather see win the title than Wilbert Robinson, the Dodger leader. But the Giants will be in a position to wreck the last Dodger hopes. A continuance of the present brand of ball being displayed by the Giants, further stretching of the winning streak and a turn of victories for the Phillies will put the final crusher on the Dodgers.

Has Confidence in Team.

Ebbets has every confidence in the ability of his team to battle through. He denied starting the rumor that Joe Tinker was to be the recipient of a collection of tinware after this season.

Tinker's team has an even break with the Dodgers so far and, there are two games left, Bill Vaughn started the first tussle against the Dodgers and won it. He worked part of yesterday's first game and Tinker declares the big southpaw will get another crack at the Brooklyn crowd before the Cubs depart.

The double barreled scrap yesterday was as hard fought as any games that have been witnessed on Ebbets field this year.

The crowd got in on the play by rising en masse and booing President Weeghman of the Cubs when he was spotted.

While the Dodgers are struggling with the Cubs the Phillies will take on the Reds again today and endeavor to repeat the lambasting they dished out to Matty's men yesterday.

In the American league the Red Sox need only four games now to clinch the pennant. They have an off day today and will open tomorrow at home. Jack Barry, second baseman of the Champions, will get back in harness for the final drive.

MAN IS SOUGHT IN MURDER CASE

Authorities Are Looking for Forrester Dillman, Shoe Worker, For Connections With the Shooting.

LIVED HERE SIX MONTHS

Scarlett Funeral Is Held This Morning—Body Sent to La Harpe For Burial.

Forrester Dillman, a shoe worker, is being sought by the police here in connection with the death of Edward Scarlett, who was shot and killed at Eleventh and Johnson streets, on Saturday night. No arrests had been made in the case up until this afternoon.

Authorities state that Dillman got out of town and efforts toward his apprehension are being made in a wide territory. His capture is expected. No warrant of any kind has been sworn out here yet for his arrest.

Dillman is a married man and had been living in Keokuk for about six months. He was employed at the Fulskamp Bros. shoe factory and had been living on Ash street. The authorities have the following description of the man wanted: Age, 22 to 26 years; height, about 5 feet, 2 inches; weight about 110 pounds. He is of slender build and has light brown hair and wore a dark blue suit and light soft hat it is said, on Saturday night.

Authorities state that the motive for the shooting was an alleged insult to Mrs. Dillman.

The funeral of Edward Scarlett, the victim, was held from the chapel of Holbrook Bros. this morning at 11 o'clock. This afternoon the body was sent to La Harpe, Ill., for burial.

SHOW VALUE OF SPRAYING

Demonstration Will be Held at Newlon Farm, October 3—All Invited.

The Newlon-Voss orchard, one-half mile east of Argyle has been sprayed the past season under the direction of the agricultural extension department of the Iowa State college, Ames, Iowa.

The Ames men will be here October 2, 3 and 4 to harvest the fruit and give the results, together with information about spraying, gathering, packing and storing of apples. Everyone is invited to attend. The meeting will be held in the orchard at 2 p. m. Tuesday, October 3.

1915 results from ten orchards similar to the Newlon-Voss orchard, were as follows: Sprayed: Yield 7.6 bushels, seventy-five per cent clean; 18.85 per cent scabby; 6.55 per cent wormy. Not sprayed: 5.95 bushels, yield; 6.37 per cent clean; 87.99 per cent scabby; 21.43 per cent wormy.

The average cost per tree per season last year for spraying, including material, labor and depreciation was 25.5c.

Part of this orchard had been killed by the San Jose scale. Come out and see how the lime-sulphur has controlled the scale. The cost in this orchard this season for the three sprays has been: material \$ 1.25; labor, \$ 1.05; depreciation of machinery, \$.64, or a total of \$ 2.94 per tree.

Are your apples perfect this year? If not, it might be worth your while to come out to the Newlon-Voss orchard and learn how you might improve them.
