### THE WEATHER FOR NEXT WEEK.

A special forecast on the weather for next week has been forwarded to Observer Gosewisch by Observer Mitchell at Chicago. Here it is: Rain about Monday night or Tuesday, probably ending about Wednesday with generally fair weather the remainder of the week. Temperature will be higher the first part of the week followed by considerably cooler from the middle of the week.

With the exception of a few minor details everything is ready for the opening of Keokuk's free fall festival on Tuesday, October 3. The biggest and best attraction of the season in southeastern Iowa will be in full swing Tuesday and thousands of visitors as well as the local people will have five days of real enjoyment, good shows, and plenty of novelty features. The celebration committee has about completed its work. The details, everything is ready for the comfort of Keokuk's visitors is being cared for, and amusements which will please them have been provided. Every day next week will be a big day.

### Here's a Few Features.

On Tuesday the opening day the attractions will include the two exhibitions of flying by Ruth Law, the girl aviator. This little queen of the air does everything that is thrilling in the way of flights. There will be five free acts on the streets, and the paid shows at Fourth and Johnson streets will attract many. The Community and Hamilton bands will play on the street.

Wednesday will be club day. The canning and corn club members will be here, and their exhibits will be open for inspection. Ruth Law will give two flights. There will be free and paid attractions, and the Com-

munity and Kahoka bands will play. Thursday, October 5, will be a public day. There will be excursions in here over the T. P. & W. railroad; the Keokuk fire department will give an exhibition run during the day, and a republican speaker will be here for an address. Ruth Law will fly and there will be plenty of attractions in the free and paid acts. There will be hundreds of traveling men in line. The democrats will have their innings in the morning. The excursion on the C. B. & K. C. will arrive here at 10:00 o'clock in the morning. Ruth Law will make two flights. There will be free and paid attractions.

On Saturday, October 7, the big public wedding will be staged. The ceremony is to be performed at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The Kahoka and Warsaw bands will furnish the music. Ruth Law will make two flights. The free and paid shows will be another big attraction.

### How Shows Will Run.

The free shows on the street will

commence promptly at 1:30 o'clock at Twelfth and Main streets. The next attraction will be on Main between Seventh and Eighth streets, and then down to Third street. The last free act will be given in front of the big tent when Iko Toki does his toe slide.

The shows at the tent will commence shortly after 2:30 o'clock. At 4:00 o'clock or as soon as the tent show is completed, Ruth Law will make her day flight.

In the evening the shows will commence on the street about 7:30 o'clock and the big tent show will be pulled off at 8:30.

### The Location of Tent.

The tent has been erected at Fourth and Johnson streets. The entrance will be on South Fourth street. The tent will hold 3,000 people. The admission to this high class vaudeville show will be 25 cents. The program will include Liberati and his band and eight opera singers, the Iko Toki troupe of Japanese athletes, the Weber-Girls and Ramza and Arno and the Moroccan troupe of athletes.

### Ruth Law's Flights.

Miss Ruth Law, the girl aviator, queen of the air, America's greatest woman flyer, call her what you will, is to make two flights each day here. At night her machine will be illuminated with fireworks. Miss Law has thrilled Chicago and New York with her daring feats in the air. Miss Law's flights on Saturday will be following the wedding ceremony.
