

VILLA LOOTED

Ninety-five Persons Have Been Executed as Rebel Sympathizers in Week.

[United Press Leased Wire Service] JUAREZ, Mexico, Oct. 2.—Villa's successful attack upon Chihuahua City and Cuahuitlan have caused a shake-up of Carranzista military commanders in the north. General Ramos' command has been re-organized and General Carlos Ozuena has been sent from Saltillo to Chihuahua City to take charge of operations against the Villistas, bringing with him fifteen hundred infantry and cavalry reinforcements.

Greek Cabinet Resigns. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] LONDON, Oct. 2.—The Greek cabinet has resigned, said a Central News dispatch from Athens this evening. [The new Greek cabinet, formed only a fortnight ago, was not recognized by the allies and was generally believed to be blocking Greece's participation in the war.]
