

STATE SPECIAL AGENTS RAID NEAR-BEER SALOONS

Ten Men From State Attorney Cosson's Office, Make Clean Up in Keokuk Today.

MUCH BOOTY IS TAKEN

Injunctions to be Filed Against Places Raided, Officers Say—Analysis of Goods Taken.

Ten special agents from the office of State Attorney Cosson at Des Moines, under the leadership of H. W. Terrell of Mount Airy, made a startling swoop on Keokuk near beer saloons this morning, confiscating a large amount of wet goods of all kinds.

Search warrants for the raid were secured from the justice of the peace court of Albert Messenger at Summitville, yesterday morning. It was the intention of the state officers to make the raid yesterday but it was postponed until this morning.

The raid was a simultaneous one. Each of the ten special officers searched a near beer saloon, while the remainder of the places were visited by Special Agent Terrell and E. M. Steer, special counsel from Cosson's office, by automobile.

Raid Sudden One.
The descent of the state officers was a sudden one and in only two or three cases were they unsuccessful. The state chemist is expected here to analyze the liquors taken. According to Special Counsel Steer, injunctions will likely be filed against all of the places raided.

Where there is already temporary injunctions against the places, court proceedings will be instituted.

Here For a Week.
H. W. Terrell, who had charge of the raid, has been here since Saturday. Several other members of the party have been here several days. Some of the booty taken was brought to the police station, the rest was deposited in the county jail yard. A list of articles taken was made this morning by Mr. Steer. After everything had been accounted for, the stuff was taken into the county building and locked up.

It was brought to the police station and court house in the patrol wagon and a hired transfer. Although confiscated early this morning, the

officers were until this afternoon in bringing it all in. Each piece was labeled with the name of the place from which it was taken and the officer who took the place.

The state officers expect to leave Keokuk tonight.

The preliminaries of the raid were conducted with the greatest secrecy. Local authorities knew nothing of it until the first load of goods, from Hugh Brennan's was backed up to the police station door. Later everything at the station was transferred to the court house.

Places Raided.
Following are the places that were raided and the goods taken from each. The list is copied practically verbatim from the one kept by Mr. Steer:

- Phillip Glaser, 1200 Main street—One full half barrel and one on tap. One quart whiskey bottle partially filled with liquid.
- John A. Salzer and George Salzer, 22 South Fourth street—Six pint bottles labeled Leisy's beer, four pint bottles labeled Temp Brew, one gallon whiskey jug with one-half gallon of liquid. One half keg which was found on tap in novelty box.
- Luther Hardin, 817 Main street—Two half kegs, one on tap. Three pint bottles labeled Daisy temp beer. One gallon whiskey bottle partly filled.
- Frank Delaney, barrel of filled pint bottles labeled Leisy beer.
- W. J. Nockemper, 300 Main street—Two half barrels, one on tap. One two gallon jug full and one partly filled. Two quart whiskey bottles, one full and the other two-thirds full.
- Phillip Nichol, 1403 Main street—Two half kegs, one full and one on tap. One quart bottle with white liquid. One case containing 24 full pint bottles labeled Leisy beer.
- Al Moore, 28 Johnson street—One gallon bottle half full of dark liquid, unopened. One quart decanter labeled Pride of Maryland, nearly full and unopened. One unopened full half barrel of liquid labeled 14 gallon and stamped Popel & Giller. Had United States revenue stamp.
- Jerry Stack, 1100 Main street—One box with 11 sealed quarts, labeled Mondamin Kentucky. One bottle same, nearly full. One full quart bottle labeled Pride of Maryland. One bottle same, one-half full. Two decanters, partially filled, labeled Kentucky Tavern. Two quart whiskey bottles partly filled and two filled. Six glasses with liquid in them. Six full pints unlabeled. Nine full one-half pints unlabeled. One quart decanter labeled Old Duffield. One filled quart bottle and one partly filled. One half keg labeled "non alcoholic."
- Jack Luder, 21 South Third street—One box containing 47 one-half pints, sealed and labeled Pride of Maryland. One box containing 17 of same. One box with five quart bottles. Three loose bottles.
- B. E. Fuller, 29 South Fifth street—

Fourteen quart bottles labeled Virginia Dare wine containing revenue stamp. Two bar decanters, quart size. One quart bottle labeled Pleasant Springs whiskey, half full. One quart bottle, seven-eighths full, thought to have gin. One quart bottle, one-eighth full, labeled Mondamin whiskey. One gallon glass jug, one-half full. One half keg.

Fred Hall—One half keg. Three quart whiskey bottles with small amount of liquid in each.

Hugh Brennan, 2 South Water street—Three half kegs, one on tap. One carton containing whiskey bottles filled with liquid. One barrel filled with Leisy beer on ice. One five gallon jug partly filled.

Andrew J. Hickey, 200 B street, 1 barrel, containing thirty-five gallons, said to be whiskey. One box containing 20 one-half pints, said to be whiskey. Four cases said to contain beer, one containing 24 quarts, one 19 quarts, one 24 quarts and the fourth 27 pints. One quart whiskey bottle, full. One bottle, two-thirds full. One bottle, one-third full, labeled Jamaica Ginger. Two quart bottles, one-half barrel on tap, one-third full.


