KEEL LAID OF BIG SHIP

First Rivets Hammered Into Place for the Super Dreadnought, California.

[United Press Leased Wire Service] MARE ISLAND NAVY YARDS, Calif., Oct. 25.—In the presence of thousands of widely cherished Californians, the keel of the super-dreadnought California, the largest warship ever put under construction on the Pacific coast was laid here at noon today. U. S. Senator James D. Phelan and officers of the navy white represented the government while Congressman Curry, Mayor James Roney, of Vallejo and state and municipal officials were present.

The ceremonies took place at noon, after the battleship Oregon, famous bull dog of the navy, and itself a product of a San Francisco Bay ship yard, brought the party of federal, state and city officials here. It is the intention to launch the California in January, 1918. She will be completed and ready for a trial trip a year later.

The super dreadnought will be 624 feet long, ninety-six feet in width and forty-seven feet, two inches deep. At her mean draft, she will displace 22,800 tons, and will be capable of sustaining a speed of twenty-one knots an hour for twelve continuous hours. Her principal battery will be twelve, fourteen inch, fifty calibre breech-loading rifles.

These are to be of an exceptionally powerful new type. They will be mounted in turrets in four center line turrets, which will be heavily armored. The remainder of the armament includes twenty-two five inch rapid fire guns, four submerged torpedo tubes, four six pounders, four three inch anti-air craft guns, two one pounder guns for ship's boats, a three inch landing piece and several thirty calibre machine guns. The California machinery is to be operated by electricity. This will be furnished by mammoth generators, driven by oil burning turbines. When completed and fully manned, the California will have a complement of fifty-eight officers and 1,022 men.

Bids on Battleships. [United Press Leased Wire Service] WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The Newport News ship building and dry dock company was the lowest of four bidders in bids opened today by the navy department on four battleships.

Its bid on one electric driven battleship was \$19,470,000 and on two electric driven battleships, \$10,375,000 each. On steam driven battleships it bid \$10,980,000 for one and \$10,890,000 each on two.

The one battleship is to be completed in thirty-nine months and where two are bid for the second, is to be completed in forty-five months.

Wages and Hours. [United Press Leased Wire Service] WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The question of the wages and hours of labor will be the first thing taken up by the joint sub-committee of congress when it meets November 24 to take up its inquiry into the railway situation. Senator Newlands, chairman, announced today.

The volume and value of exports from Mexico into the United States for the year 1915-16 were the largest in the history of the republic. Imports into Mexico for the same period also showed a large increase.

ARE WAITING FOR THOSE PETTICOATS

Several Keokuk Women Send in Their Dimes and Write Chain Letters to Get New 1917 Model.

UNCLE SAM TAKES HAND

Federal Agents Are Looking up Company Promoting Idea and Finds That Members Are Absent.

Several well known Keokuk women are short a dime as the result of their "falling" for a silk petticoat chain letter scheme. It's not the loss of a dime that is hurting them so badly, however, as it is the fact that their friends have found out that they belong to the class which Barnum said like to be humbugged. If they had remembered that the postoffice department has a ruling against chain letters, and also that ten cents and five letters is a mighty small amount for a 1917 model petticoat, they might be enjoying another movie show.

But then they are not alone. The company which has been promoting this scheme is being looked up by Uncle Sam's detectives. The company, it might be said, is temporarily absent from its offices. The government agents are finding some 25,000 letters with dimes in them, however.

The following despatch from Minneapolis gives the present status of the case, and it may be cold comfort to these Keokuk women to read about the efforts of the government, to get the concern behind the plan:

Thousands of letters, each containing ten cents, are pouring into the local postoffice daily from women in various parts of the country who have joined in an "endless chain" scheme promoted by the so-called National Brokerage Exchange.

Federal agents are searching for officers of the "exchange," who are wanted for using the mails to defraud. A room in a local business block, to which all the letters are addressed, was suddenly vacated three weeks ago, the authorities say.

To every woman who would send ten cents in silver and write five friends urging them to join in the chain the "exchange" promised a "new 1917 model silk petticoat."

The volume of mail for the "exchange" is rapidly growing. Said Postmaster E. A. Purdy, "and we received 25,000 letters, inclosing 25,000 dimes."

The letter which was sent out to secure the dimes, and which was to be copied and sent to five friends is the following: Dear friend: You will surely be interested in this extraordinary gift offer now being made by the Mail Order Brokerage Exchange building, of Minneapolis, Minn., to introduce and advertise ready-to-wear goods in the least time.

We will give anyone complying with the conditions stated in one 1916 model petticoat, retailing at \$4.75. Give color and size desired. Make five copies of this letter and mail to five lady acquaintances. Send ten cents in silver to the National Mail Order Exchange building, Minneapolis, Minn., with the names and addresses of the parties and you will receive one of the silk petticoats, as described, without further expense.

BUYING BOOZE; IS FINED \$35

Nathan Mitchell of Keokuk Got into Toils of Law at Quincy a Night or Two Ago.

Nathan Mitchell of Keokuk got in trouble at Quincy a night or two ago and was assessed a fine of \$35, according to the Quincy Journal. The following account of Mitchell's wanderings from the straight and narrow path is from the Journal:

Nathan Mitchell, proprietor of a restaurant at Keokuk at which other refreshments besides food is said to be sold in a "dry" city, was arrested last night for carrying concealed weapons after he had pressed a gun against the temple of Tony Badamo, a taxi cab driver, and ordered the frightened Tony to proceed on his way.

Mitchell came to Quincy to buy a stock of goods for his restaurant. In his valise were found several gallons of whiskey, 13 pint bottles of John Barleycorn and several other quarts of intoxicants. He called the taxi cab to Elm between Seventh and Eighth streets, last evening at 6 o'clock and Badamo responded.

Said registers will also be in session at the same places on said Saturday, November 4th, 1916, from eight (8) o'clock a. m. until nine (9) o'clock p. m. for the purpose of revising, correcting and compiling the registrations.

First precinct—Sixth street engine house.

Third precinct—Leake Printing Co. office, No. 801 Main street.

Fourth precinct—West Keokuk Engine house.

Fifth precinct—Camp's drug store, Twelfth and Fulton streets.

Seventh precinct—Jos. Sittler's grocery store, 1723 Main street.
