

OVERLAND-IRWIN TEAM IS WINNER

Defeated Standard Four Five in the Opening Class in the Commercial League Last Night.

ELECTRICS DEFEATED

Measure of Up Town Team Taken by the Power House Quintette—Two Big Games Tomorrow.
