

### NEW STREET CAR FOR K. E. LINES

Has Many New Features That Have Never Been Tried Out in Car Construction Before.

### CONSIDERABLY LIGHTER

Does Not Weigh Half as Much as Cars Now in Use of the Same Capacity—Is One Man Car.

A new street car, embodying in addition to all of the best qualities of the cars now in use, a number of new features which promise to revolutionize car construction, and weighing less than half as much as a standard make of nearly the same capacity and size, has just been acquired by the Keokuk Electric company.

The street car is built after a special design and there are not more than two dozen in use in the United States as yet. A few months ago Manager J. P. Ingle of the Keokuk Electric company saw one of the first models made and immediately put in an order for one. It arrived this week and will be placed on some portion of the company's lines in a few days.

Lighter and Safer. The designer had in mind the construction of a car that would be lighter, safer, cheaper and easier to handle than the present cars and his ideas carried out in the car that has been received here, are revolutionary in several respects.

The street car was built by the American Car company of St. Louis. It was designed by C. O. Birney and is known as the Birney car. The weight is only 11,000 pounds, whereas the ones in use in Keokuk now weigh 14,000 pounds. The new car will seat twenty-nine persons; the ones in use now, thirty-two.

The car is operated throughout by air, including the brakes, door mechanism, steps, etc. It is so constructed that one man is all that is needed to run it.

Motorman Sits Down. The motorman has a stool to sit on. With one hand he works the controller and with the other the compressed air machine that regulates the brakes, doors, etc., while with his feet he can sound the bell and ring up fares.

The car is equipped with a thermostat which automatically controls the heating and does not allow the temperature to go above or below a certain range. This apparatus is also being placed on all of the cars of the Keokuk Electric company.

On the front end of the car, by the side of the motorman, is the fare box. The passenger drops his fare in this and the motorman turns a crank and the amount is registered on a dial on the box. As soon as the register has been made, and not before, the motorman can take the money out of the box. There is no way of getting at the money until the amount has been registered.

The doors are opened and the step lowered by air. The car is so constructed that the door cannot be opened until after the car has stopped, or the car started until after the door is closed.

Emergency Control. One of the most remarkable features of the car is the way it is controlled in cases of emergency. If the motorman should faint, or drop dead, or release his hand from the controller during some accident or excitement, the power is automatically shut off, and brakes are put on the doors opened and sand deposited on the rails.

When this occurs it takes forty-five seconds to start the car again. This is a penalty to keep the motorman from using the emergency stop at street corners.

The handles by which passengers help themselves on and off the car are on the inside and when the door is closed, there is nothing to hang on to from the outside. A special headlight is provided.

Two models of the car were made last year. One was exhibited in Texas and the other in Seattle, Wash. The Keokuk Electric company ordered one from the first model shown and received its car from the first twelve made this year.

A similar car was on exhibit at the street railway convention at Atlantic City this month and met with hearty approval of street railway men.

### BALLOTS SENT TO SOLDIERS

3,622 Iowa Militiamen Are on the Border and Will Cast Their Vote. DES MOINES, Nov. 2.—Ballots for the soldier boys now at Brownsville, Tex., arranged by counties, were packed by the secretary of state's office yesterday and were shipped by express last night. It is expected they will reach the border by Saturday at the latest. Secretary Allen expects the ballots to get there Friday.

The muster-in rolls show that there are 3,622 soldiers on the border, 21 years of age and over, from ninety-four counties. In order to have a few extra ballots for each county, Secretary Allen had about 4,500 ballots printed. There will be at least seven polling places for the soldiers, one for each separate organization or detachment. It will be a big task to count the ballots, however, as there are ninety-five different ballots in all and they will have to be counted by counties. It is expected the judges will count the votes for president and for governor first and give this count out so that it can be telegraphed to Iowa, and then take up the remainder of the ticket.

Black Hawk county has the most soldiers on the border over twenty-one years of age, so the records in Adjutant General Logan's office show. That county is credited with having 112 men. Linn county comes next with 198. Woodbury ranks third with 186. Polk has 159. Scott 151, Webster, 148, Cerro Gordo 145, Clinton 135 and Johnson 126.

### PAPER FORCED TO SUSPEND

Rapid Advance in Cost of Print Paper Puts Cedar Falls Gazette Out of Business. CEDAR FALLS, Iowa, Nov. 2.—The Cedar Falls Gazette, at one time one of the most prominent weekly newspapers in the state, has been forced to suspend publication owing to the rapid advance in the cost of print paper. Whether or not publications will be resumed in case of a decrease in paper cost, has not been determined.

The Cedar Falls Gazette was founded in 1869 by George D. Perkins, later famous as the forceful editor of the Sioux City Journal and whose death occurred two years ago. Perkins disposed of the paper twenty years after its foundation.

Don't rhapsodize impulsively over November. October made a fine start and gave us some beautiful and nasty days.

Now that the hunting season has arrived, it will be a good thing to remember that when the white people came to this section of Nauvoo and Illinois they found it overflowing with wild life. Flocks of wild pigeons were so great that they obscured the sun; they were hours passing a given point and one could not see either edge of the flock. Today the wild pigeon are gone. A large share of the pigeons were killed in the name of sport and many were fed to the hogs. Even buffaloes were killed for their skins and their meat left to rot on the prairie. Today the wild turkey, wild goose, wood duck and canvassback are on the way to extinction in many parts. Organizations of sportsmen are doing fine work in educating public sentiment in this waste and in carrying on shorter open seasons, prohibition of the sale of game at all times, laws against repeating shotguns, etc. Every man who goes out hunting this fall and winter should kill sparingly, remembering how our great heritage of wild life has been squandered and how this section has become tenantless. The taxpayer should have wild life too valuable an asset to be slaughtered indiscriminately. Destruction of useful birds costs the country hundreds of millions in the ravages of insect pests. Furthermore, should existing game birds become extinct, there will be a demand from the sportsmen for foreign varieties, a proceeding that will involve heavy charges. Better save the birds now living. The section from which wild life has been exterminated is as dreary as a house without human beings. Game is gradually being driven toward remote refuges. Unless the remnant left is carefully preserved, hunting in a few years will be mostly a memory. It is almost that now in Nauvoo's vicinity.


