## MINISTER HAS NOT RETURNED

Disappeared in Chicago With Several Hundred Dollars in His Pocket Book.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—He was carrying papers showing ownership of more than \$450,000 worth of Chicago real estate and several hundred dollars when he started home from Chicago, but James Alexander Hayward, 64 year old minister of Berrien Springs, Mich., never arrived here. His wife and nephew have asked the police here to help locate him.

Hayward recently had trouble with a cabaret entertainer known as Mrs. Eleanor Bell. She admitted having stolen \$661 from him and is now serving a jail sentence.

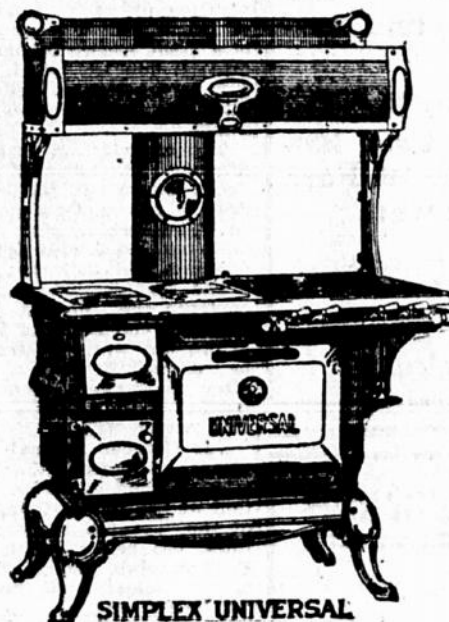
