TO TAKE INJURED MORROCAN HOME

Shriff Ben All Improves Sufficiently to Allow Plans for His Removal to Chicago to be Made.

VERTEBRA DISLOCATED

Boy Fell at the Tent Show at Fall Celebration—Devotion of Older Companion is Touching.

It's going to be a happy Thanksgiving day for Shriff Ben All and his companion, Agoram. The injured Moroccan lad at Graham hospital has grown enough better in the six weeks that he has been at the local hospital that he can be removed to his home in Chicago. Shriff's foster mother, Mrs. Ward, is here today, and her plans are to take the boy back to Chicago tomorrow afternoon.

The Moroccan boy was injured in the last performance of the Moroccan Arab troupe in the big tent show at the Keokuk fall festival October 7. He fell from the shoulders of his companions, while trying to save the youngest member of the troupe from a bad fall, and in falling to the stage, suffered a fractured dislocation of the neck at the sixth cervical vertebra.

An operation was performed the following morning at Graham hospital to bring the vertebra back into shape. Since that time the boy has patiently suffered while nature and medical science came to his aid. Of late he has been able to raise his arm, and can touch his face with his hand and raise his arm over his head and hold it there for a moment.

Devotion of Companion. During his six weeks of illness, Shriff has been constantly cared for by his aged companion, Agoram, who felt that he was responsible for the boy's fall. It was a most touching picture of friendship, the devotion of this older man for the boy. He has faithfully kept his vigil at the sick boy's bedside and stayed at the hospital from early in the morning until late in the evening.

Of late there has been more of a smile in the older man's eyes, and he has happily watched the improvement in his young charge.

The sick boy has received the very best of care from the nurses and doctors at the hospital and his ultimate recovery is hoped for by Dr. W. Frank Brown, who has been in charge of the case, and who feels that the boy has already made rapid strides towards recovery.

ANXIOUS FOR PEACE TO COME

Wall Street is Beginning to Worry Over the Length of European War.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Wall street is "anxious" for the war to end, in the opinion of prominent diplomats here today.

"Just a touch of timidity," over securities for vast loans, plus a growing decrease in munitions contracts, is said to be responsible for this increasing financial desire for peace. The financiers are said to fear—not measurably yet, but sufficiently to stir them—that their loans may be affected if Europe tries to pile up more credits while destroying more lives and property.

This spirit was called the "inspiration" for recent peace talk, notably in New York, by a high official today.

According to this official, those showing restiveness, claimed to see encouragement in the recent statement in an interview of the Earl of Derby, British under secretary for war, that England was willing to listen to Germany's peace terms.

The present peace agitation, which diplomats emphasized, has its source in financial circles solely, will include according to tentative plans, an appeal to President Wilson, possibly in co-operation with European neutrals, to call a conference not primarily to discuss peace, but merely to define the objects for which each side in the great war is fighting.

The proposals do not include suggestion of an armistice, but diplomats here believe if the suggestion is carried through to the point of a conference of neutrals an armistice would be entirely within possibility's bounds.

\$100,000 Factory Fire

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—A \$100,000 fire in a crowded manufacturing district here today threatened dozens of buildings when the Hoday Paint company's warehouse at 1831 Carroll avenue, caught fire. Firemen had a narrow escape when explosions of oil caused one wall to collapse. Spontaneous combustion is believed to have been the cause of the fire. The Johnson Tomek Lumber company in the same building and the Hub Electric company adjoining, also suffered small losses. The fire was under control at 8:30 a. m.

Killed by Fall

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] TOPEKA, Kans., Nov. 28.—Francis M. Brady, 44, assistant United States district attorney for Kansas, was dead today, the result of a fall from a third story window of the Thropp hotel here last night. Brady's skull was crushed when he hit the pavement and he died instantly. No one was with Brady at the time of the fall.

OTTERTVILLE, Iowa, Nov. 28.—"Uncle Jimmy" O'Brien, Buchanan's centennarian and probably the oldest man in Iowa, is ill and probably cannot recover. Mr. O'Brien was born in Ireland Aug. 1, 1816, and came to America when 16 years of age, first settling in Pennsylvania. In 1857 he came to Iowa and went to Buchanan county in 1862. He had \$600 at that time. By thrift and hard work O'Brien managed to increase his wealth to such an extent that before retiring from farming he owned several hundred acres, most of it valued at more than \$200 an acre. Some years ago he divided the bulk of his acreage among his children, only retaining 207 acres for himself.


