TRACK RECORD IS BROKEN

Mile in 2:12 1/4 Made by Allmore in Three-Year-Old Race at the Carthage Fair Thursday Afternoon.

CARTHAGE, Ill., Aug. 27.—One track record was smashed at the Hancock county fair Thursday when Allmore, in the three-year-old pace, reeled off the second heat in 2:12 1/4 for an easy win over the field of four starters. The race went to Allmore in straight heats, and the time set is considered exceptional on a half-mile track for three-year-old pacers.

In the 2:10 pace there was a trifle more competition, but the money went to Little George in a driving heat, with Billy Lee second and King Earl third, the horses finishing in each heat as they did in the race.

In the 2:18 trot there was stiffer competition. After Chimeswood had won the first heat he was forced to take third money in the second, but repeated with another first in the third. Janos had captured the second heat and Grubb urged the son of Azoll under the wire in the fourth heat ahead of Chimeswood in a driving finish. Under the trotting rules the two heat winners alone were permitted to finish the race, and the Galesburg man sent Janos under the wire several lengths ahead of the Peter Wood colt.

The mule race, which closed the program, attracted six starters and furnished a hippodrome to a day of good harness events.

MAY ALWAYS IN WHIRLWIND

Last Year He Was Storm Center of American League and at Present is Cause of Strife.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Carl Mays, pitcher, has been a storm center most of his baseball life.

Last year the American league records were withheld several months while President Ban Johnson and club owners jangled over whether Mays lawfully belonged to the New York Yankees or was subject to discipline for leaving the Bostonians.

This year he is a center of a storm that may involve all clubs. Demands that Mays be barred from the game have flared up again. This time they threaten to cause strife that may call up the question of the strength of playing contracts and the power of owners and league officers.
