A Letter From Northern Arkansas.

WEINER, ARKANSAS, February 8, '97.
EDITOR JOURNAL.—I am not a patron of your paper but have a good many relations and friends who are, therefore, with your consent, I will give them a few facts through the columns of your valuable paper concerning Arkansas and Poinsett county in particular. Within the borders of this State exists almost every variety of soil and climate. There are hills and mountains, plains, forests, undulating prairies, swamps and undulating lands; the first comprises about one-third of the State and is in the north-eastern part. The next is what is known as the Mississippi bottoms and extend from the base of the mountains to the first bottoms, or low lands, the latter being in the eastern part of the State and borders on the Mississippi river and its tributaries. All these low lands are covered with hardwood timber. Prairie, Poinsett and Cross counties are principally on the second bottom and abound in heavy hardwood timber, consisting of all varieties of oaks and hickory; and the prairie land is covered with blue stem grass which yield from one to two tons of hay per acre and the hay sells from \$4.00 to \$8.00 per ton. No State stands ahead of Arkansas in fruits, berries, vegetables, cranberries and such like. Arkansas is world-wide known for its stock country and costs nominally nothing to raise cattle or hogs, and no country offers greater inducements than does this State for stock raising, the winters being so mild and short that not over two months of the year are needed. The alluvial soil on all this second bottom land contains the condensed richness of decayed vegetable deposits for ages past and will produce a splendid crop of cotton, which heretofore has been the principal crop, but recent settlers have proven that soil which will produce cotton will bring forth a paying crop of corn and other crops are raised on this land as well. In fact it is not necessary to eulogize a State where good soil and a variety of products are so well known. Arkansas' laws are just to the creditor as well as to the debtor. Her free public school system challenges the world; her school fund is the largest of any state—a district of fifty scholars can support a six months' school without a cent of direct taxation. Arkansas has about 4,000 school houses, and half of them have been built within the past eight years. The limit to which taxation may go is fixed by the constitution and cannot exceed three per centum of the assessed valuation, and the State has not levied its limit for years. Counties, cities and towns are prohibited from issuing any interest bearing debt, hence no bonded indebtedness exists to burden the taxpayers. The taxes in Poinsett county are from \$4.00 to \$6.00 per quarter section. The increased population is proof of the strength of the country's soil and attractiveness of its climate. The population in 1870 was 484,471, and in 1890 it was 1,128,179. Raw land can still be bought here at from \$6.00 to \$10.00 per acre, but cheap homes will soon be a thing of the past in this country. Weiner is on the main line of the St. Louis & South-Western Railway, is 288 miles south-west of St. Louis; 146 miles north-west of Cairo, Illinois; 155 miles north-east of Little Rock, Arkansas, and 100 miles north-west of Memphis, Tennessee. As my letter is already too long I will desist.
