The democrats won quite a handsome victory in Audubon county last Tuesday, considering that last year the republicans elected the county officers by big majorities by Bryan, Audubon. This year the republican ticket received a plurality of 112. The democrats elect Thos Kelley, representative, by 6 majority; J. H. Jones, sheriff, by 58; R. C. Spencer, superintendent, by 142. The republicans elect L. D. Pines, treasurer, by 158 majority; Nels P. Hoeh, supervisor, by 317; W. R. Koob, coroner, by 155; H. S. Wattles, surveyor, by 100.

The Iowa fish car, "Hawkeye," has already made two trips this week into the interior of the State with the car filled to its utmost capacity with fine young German carp. They will be distributed to various places all over the state, stocking private ponds, etc. Commissioner of Fisheries is exultant over the supply pond here. Six carloads of game fish have been shipped from here this fall, and the carload of German carp will make the seventh. This will not end the work by any means. Corps of men are gathering the small fry and placing them in the supply pond every day, and will keep steadily at it until winter checks them. More fish have already been obtained than could have been raised at the hatchery in years and at a mere trifle of an expense to the state.--Sabbath Gazette.

We clip the following from the Evening Record, of Allegheny, Pa., under date of November 2, in regard to Chas. Smith, a former Exira boy: "C. E. Smith is pastor of the Church of Christ at Pine Flats, Pa. Three years ago, while a student at Drake university, Des Moines, Iowa, he was taken ill with peritonitis. Since that time he has had 12 very severe recurrences.

On September 11 he entered the Presbyterian hospital, on Sherman avenue, to be operated on for appendicitis. Dr. William M. Beach was his surgeon, assisted by the medical staff of the hospital and although the patient was in a very delicate condition, he was operated on September 15. Investigation revealed a very decayed condition of the intestines on the right side of the left side of the abdomen, besides numerous adhesions. The appendix, with an enclosed entralitic was removed, the adhesion broken up, the abdomen, being cleansed by an antiseptic solution, was closed and healing took place quickly. But the previously existent fever caused the intestines to grow together in a mass, and also to the abdominal walls, and after nine days of intense suffering, it was apparent that only a second operation gave any chance for life. This was done. Next day his pulse was 150 per minute, his temperature being but 95 4-5 degrees. Telegrams called relatives and friends to his bedside, yet, to the great surprise of doctors and nurses, after two days of uncertainty, he gradually recovered, and was released from the hospital on October 23. He is still in the city, visiting at the home of his friend, Thomas W. Lindsay, of Linden avenue, East End, Pittsburg.

Mr. Smith is a young man of 25 years, and has much confidence of again being restored to robust health. Upon being asked by a reporter to what he attributed his recovery he replied: "The prayers of my parishioners, and also of Allegheny; y. tu. tiring and faithful nurses."
