township creamery people representing dairy products of the locality were entered by Audubon township. Both of them showed great care in their preparation and won a hearty share of the praise given the parade.

Hamlin township traced the development of transportation from its primitive stages. A prairie schooner led the procession, followed an almost prehistoric wagon. Next in order came a cart, a carriage and old Ford, and finally a high-powered modern automobile. They also had the only horse-drawn float in the parade, one built of farm products carrying a banner bearing the name of their township made out of farm products. Hamlin was entered for the first time and made a showing that indicates that some of the other townships will have some real competition from them in the future.

Following the parade, everybody enjoyed a basket dinner in the park and on the lawns of the homes. Coffee was furnished by the Exira Commercial Club.

At one o'clock the formal program of the day was begun. Rev. C. E. Henry gave the address of welcome which was responded to by O. F. Ide, president of the day. The Exira double quartet gave several selections. This is a musical organization of no small ability and the music was greatly appreciated.

The main address of the day was given by C. W. Hunt, president of the state federation, in the absence of Secretary E. H. Cunningham, who had been called to Washington. He pleaded for the continued cooperation of members in these times when the results for which they had hoped seem to be so slow in materializing.

"Poison is being injected into the organization," he said, "by

those persons who have not the patience to wait for results for which it was organized. Other organizations are feeling the effect of our federation's work more than many of you know. The handling of our own products and our program which brings producer and consumer together has brought about some unusual activity on the part of those whose business is being hurt by such a program. All that is needed to secure our end is continued faith in the farm bureau for it has already won many victories and is on the eve of many more that are greater still."

He pointed out the things that have been secured from congress and the state legislature through the federation; brought out the fact that officials of the federal reserve banks have been apprised of the condition of the farmers that would not have been possible without a strong central organization. Those men who have attempted to hinder the farm bureau movement during the period of the war and since, are not the ones who offered the supreme sacrifice for democracy, he said.
