IOWA NEWS BRIEFS

The local lodge of Eiks will erect a new home at Davenport.

B. H. Mummy, an old time resident and soldier, died in his home in Odebolt.

John Whittager of Sheffield has purchased a hotel at Sioux Rapids for \$18,000.

Mr. and Mrs. W. C. McCurdy celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at Massena.

Miss Margaret Trometer, of Hinton, was married to Thomas Bogner, also of that place.

A fire destroyed the auto owned by C. G. Tucker of Creston and threatened several residences.

George W. Palliday of Allerton will locate at Centerville and manufacture a patent broom corn harvester.

In Jones county during the last year 168 marriage licenses were issued. There were twenty-two divorces.

Lee Harris, convicted of the burglary of a store at Carroll, has been sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary.

The progressives of Ida county have issued an announcement that they will have a rally and banquet March 12.

C. E. Griffith of Sioux City will go into partnership with H. H. Tremaine in the operation of the Willard hotel of St. Paul.

Charles Ryan of Fort Dodge has been named to succeed Tom McWilliams as manager of the Wales hotel at Dubuque.

A. P. Hennings, a clothier at Manning, was found dead in bed. He had been in business there a little more than two years.

Burglars forced entrance to the B. K. Berry book store in Creston, securing a small amount of cash and some merchandise.

The Fort Dodge city council has purchased an automobile fire truck costing \$5,500. This is the first truck of the kind in the city.

Through the death of his grandfather in Peoria, Ill., George Holbrook, a waiter in the Des Moines club, is heir to \$10,000.

Invitations have been issued for the marriage of Miss Edith Louise Mather to Rev. Henry H. Schumaker in Iowa City on March 10.

The small son of Mr. and Mrs. Forest Allen of Prescott was so badly burned while playing with matches that his life is despaired of.

The new Masonic lodge at Rockwell City has been completed and is said to be the most complete lodge house in northwestern Iowa.

Miss Gladys Wells, secretary of the Associated Charities at Fort Dodge, has been appointed by the school board to act as truant officer.

A new ordinance has been enforced at Ames, requiring every young woman unable to attend gymnasium classes to stay home from dances.

Senator W. S. Kenyon will deliver the address at the Larrabee memorial services to be held by a joint session of the state legislature on March 21.

Miss Irene Baughman, who represented Griswold high school in the district declamatory contest at Adair, won first honors in the humorous class.

Lenox has been chosen as one of the smaller towns of the state for experimenting with free postal delivery, which the postmaster has ordered.

Nelson Carlson, aged 25, of Fort Dodge, was killed instantly when he fell from a trestle over Blood creek, near Livermore, on which he was working.

The resignation of the Rev. E. E. Evans, pastor of the Baptist church at Hampton, was accepted. The Rev. Mr. Evans will go to Cambridge, Ill., May 10th.

Mrs. Eliza A. Olney of Knoxville has watched the development of Iowa through more than three-quarters of a century. She came to Jefferson county in 1836.

Shortly after he left the train at Marshalltown, Jacob Viele, aged 82, of Grinnell, dropped dead of heart disease. He left a sickbed to appear in a damage suit.

Articles of incorporation have been filed for a new bank in Greenfield, to be called the Greenfield Savings bank. W. L. Battin is president and R. A. Shreves is cashier.

A fuel economy campaign is the latest innovation by the Illinois Central railroad. This is accomplished through the medium of a moving picture theater on wheels.

The dates for the Iowa State Firemen's tournament have been set for July 22, 23, 24 and 25, to be held at Perry. Purse and prizes amounting to \$4,000 will be offered.

Romey Massey, a farmer living east of Leon, was killed in a runaway between Woodland and Lineville. The team became frightened and Massey was thrown to the ground.

John Gilmore, one of the pioneers of the northeast part of the county, died of paralysis at the home of his son, Thomas Gilmore, in Zearing. He was more than 70 years old.

Kirk Duncan, a prominent farmer near Council Bluffs, died as the result of injuries sustained several days ago by being thrown from a tree. He leaves a large family.

Fred Shuman of Mason City, indicted on a charge of assault to commit murder, was sentenced to six months in jail after pleading guilty. Shuman hit James Sullivan with an iron bar.

The Northern Iowa Power Co. is rushing to completion its \$30,000 auxiliary steam plant. Early in March the company expects to be sending electric power to Gilmore City, Rolfe, Laurens and Havelock.

With the last note of the concluding number of a program from a symphony orchestra still swelling through the Sioux City First Baptist church, J. K. Hurd, a player of the clarinet, fell dead from his chair.

A committee from the Business Men's association is co-operating with the board of trustees in Osage. The committee is desirous of urging a campaign for \$25,000 to build a new school at the Cedar Valley seminary.

Joseph Bremerman of Pontiac, Ill., is visiting his brother, J. W. Bremerman, and his niece, Mrs. Clinton Crouch of Boone. It has been fifty-six years since the brothers met, although they lived only 300 miles apart.

George P. Serauer & Son are building an elevator at Arlington. They are now engaged in wrecking both the Hewett and Bingham elevators, and will build a new structure with a capacity of 28,000 bushels on the site.

The Frank White Holstein-Friesian cattle sale held at Hampton is said to have been one of the largest stock sales ever held in Iowa. The average price for the hundred head listed was \$200 an animal, and a milch cow brought \$420.

Charles S. Stabler, after twenty-six years of continuous service, has resigned his position with the Chicago & Great Western Railway Co., and after March 1 will remove from Clarion to his 190-acre farm near Charles City.

Miss Anna Booth, a graduate of Chicago university, Stout institute and the Illinois Woman's college, has been added to the faculty of Iowa State college at Ames. She takes an assistant professorship in domestic art and interior decoration.

On a forgery charge Mrs. Anna Michaels was fined \$300 and costs by Judge Clark at Mason City. She pleaded guilty of drawing a check on a Duluth bank and securing the money. The fine was paid by relatives and she was released.

G. H. Lee of Clarion has brought suit against the lighting plant, which he holds responsible for the accident when the plant blew up and did considerable damage to his house. Lockwood & Son, agents for the company, are also named as defendants.

Although Waterloo as a city is on the water wagon, there have been many arrests for drunkenness and some have told the officers that they procured their liquor at local places. This has moved the chief of police to start a crusade against bootleggers.

Two women of the Lake City Monday club are working on their course in domestic economy to be given the first week of March. The course will be given under the direction of the extension department at Ames. The proceeds will be given to the city library book fund.


A northbound way train for Creston crashed into the way car of a freight bound for Villisca, setting fire to the car of the Creston train. Engineer C. B. Heflin and Fireman E. R. Lynch of this city jumped from their train just before the locomotive struck and escaped injury.

Reck Peterson of Albia, the 13-year-old son of James Peterson, is hovering between life and death as a result of a bullet passing through his lungs. He was out hunting with his father and brother, and while crawling through some brush his rifle was accidentally discharged.

Fifteen farmers and their families have procured a train of twenty freight cars and will leave Cedar Falls the first of next month for points in Canada, where they will engage in farming. Last fall a large number of farmers from that vicinity visited points in Canada and leased farms.

Mrs. Agnes Hudek, of Fort Dodge, has been taken to the insane hospital at Cherokee. Mrs. Hudek has only been married for about three months and is only 19 years old. A short time ago she saw a face at the window, which so frightened her that her nervous system completely gave way and all efforts to treat her by local doctors seemed fruitless.

When Trailer, a Scotch collie watch dog owned by W. E. Morley of Fontanelle, smelled smoke in the early hours of the morning, he went to his master's bedroom door and scratched upon it, howling piteously, until Mr. Morley arose and opened the door. Morley found the hall filled with smoke, and barely got out the members of his family before the entire upper part of the house was ablaze.


