## DIFFERS WITH HIS CHIEF

Assistant Secretary of State Wilson Quits Job.  
Washington, March 21.—Huntington Wilson, assistant and acting secretary of state, has resigned that office and insisted upon immediate acceptance of his radical difference of opinion with the administration regarding its Chinese policies.  
A probable result of the resignation will be the immediate appointment, under a recess commission, of John Bassett Moore, as counselor of the department of state, with authority to act as secretary.

## CARRANZA TROOPS ARE SLAUGHTERED

Many Followers of Rebel Governor Killed or Wounded.

Brownsville, Tex., March 26.—An official dispatch from Monterey says that between 300 and 400 of the followers of Venustiano Carranza, rebel governor of the state of Coahuila, were killed or injured in a battle with federal troops near Saltillo.  
The rebels, numbering about 2,000, are reported to be in full retreat from the town of Monclova, with General Lopez and 1,500 men in pursuit.

## ARE NEARER TO THEIR GOAL

Bulgarians Capture First Line of Defenses at Adrianople.  
Sofia, March 26.—After a day of desperate fighting at Adrianople under cover of their siege guns the Bulgarians captured the first line of the Turkish defenses, according to a statement by the war office.  
The war office confirmed the reported surrender of Djavid Pasha, the Turkish leader, and 15,000 of his men. Djavid Pasha commanded the Seventh corps of the Ottoman army and capitulated to the Servians on the Skumbi river in Albania.

## HUPMOBILE WINSSWEDISH RUN

Is the First Out of Sixty-Six to Cover 738 Mile Course in Reliability. English Car Second.

Paris, France, March 4.—Of the sixty-six entries in the Swedish reliability trials which started in Sweden, February 23rd and covered 1181 kilometers or 738 miles, number one "Hupmobile," which was first to start in the contest, was first to reach the finishing line. The second was an English Daimler; the third, a Swedish car, the Scania Vabis. In the contest were nineteen American machines, thirty Germans, five English, two Swedish, four Belgians, four French, and two Italians. Little snow was encountered during the trials, but the greatest difficulty was experienced with the ice coating on the hills, due to which it was thought at one time it would be advisable to postpone the trials.

## BILL FOR MINIMUM WAGE

Minnesota House Passes Measure Affecting Women.  
St. Paul, March 26.—The Wilson minimum wage bill passed the house by a vote of 61 to 10, without debate. Apparently unaware that the vote was being taken before it was well under way the opposition waited for the result and then began a fight for reconsideration. After a heated debate the reconsideration attempt was defeated.  
The proposed minimum wage commission will have the authority to probe working conditions of women and fix a living wage. A separate resolution for a vice commission like the one in Illinois is pending in the house.

## INDIANS THREATEN MINERS

Massacre Feared in Remote Section of British Columbia.  
Vancouver, B. C., March 26.—Indians of the remote northern districts of British Columbia are making threats of massacre against the miners of the Teslin Lake country.  
This information was brought to civilization by Rev. John Chown, superintendent of Methodist missions for the province.  
Owing to the fact that there are no railroads in the territory threatened and practically no wagon roads it would be difficult to cope with an outbreak.

## THIRD DEGREE FORBIDDEN

War Department Protects Enlisted Men Under Suspicion.  
Washington, March 26.—The war department has forbidden the practice of the "third degree" in the examination of enlisted men suspected of military offenses and a recent circular prohibiting officers from asking incriminating questions of prisoners under examination has called forth serious objection.  
Officers insist the order is calculated to injure the service by depriving the examining authorities of opportunity to learn the truth.

## Passengers Narrowly Escape.

Bellefontaine, O., March 26.—The engine and rear sleeping car of west-bound Pennsylvania train No. 3 plunged into Mad river at the edge of West Liberty, but the sleeping car fell at the side of the stream and the passengers crawled through the windows and waded to shore. The other six coaches of the train remained on the rails.

## Million Damage at Chicago.

Chicago, March 26.—Wiresmen of the fire department are working strenuously to restore the electric alarm system, seriously impaired by the storm. It is estimated that the damage done in Cook county will aggregate \$1,000,000. The greatest loss falls on the telegraph and telephone companies.

## Found Not Guilty of Arson.

Chicago, March 26.—Joseph Frank, one of the two scores of men arrested as a result of the "arson trust" investigation, was found not guilty by a jury in Judge Windes' court. Frank collected \$1,600 for a fire in his clothing store.

# GROW BETTER CORN

Increase the Yield by Securing a Better Stand.

Seed Testing and Grading Work to Be Done by Grain Committee of County Farm Bureau.

Here are three ways to increase the corn yield:

First, by testing the vitality or germinating power of every ear of corn intended for planting.  
Second, by grading the seed corn to kernels of uniform size and shape.  
Third, by testing and adjusting the planter to secure the dropping of the proper number of kernels in each hill.

A "poor stand" of corn is responsible more than anything else for the low average of corn in the central west. The ground may be rich, the preparation good, and the corn receive the best of cultivation, but if the stand is poor the yield will be correspondingly poor.  
Careful counts of the number of stalks per hill were made one year in more than a thousand different corn fields in Iowa, and it would be safe to say that there was not to exceed 66 per cent. of a perfect stand on an average, and in some cases it fell as low as 40 per cent. This meant that Iowa devoted nearly 9,000,000 acres to corn and produced only a 6,000,000 crop, or to put it in another way, with a perfect stand the present average yield of 33 bushels would be increased to 50 bushels per acre, or an increase to the state of 153,000,000 bushels. This does not take into consideration the increased yield made possible through the use of improved varieties, better bred seed, elimination of barren stalks by means of breeding, better methods of cultivation, selecting, storing, etc.

One fall I visited a farm of 200 acres of corn which showed 39 per cent. of a stand. During the conversation it developed that the farmer had tested neither his seed nor the planter, and had kept both of his boys out of school during the summer to work, as he was "behind" and had "some bad debts to pay." He "intended to test" his "seed," but was "so crowded with other work" that he "could not get to it."  
If he had spent five or six days in March, when his time was otherwise of little value, in testing the germinating power of every ear of corn, and had properly graded it to uniform size of kernels and had picked out the broken, rotten and discolored kernels, and had then tested his planter and adjusted the planter plates to drop the proper number of kernels to the hill, he could have laid off the rest of the year, sent his boys to school and been more than a thousand dollars ahead. A few days spent at the right time on our seed corn may be worth more to us than a whole year's work.

## CORN MATHEMATICS.

Corn Growers, Figure for Yourselves. Can't You Grow Ten Bushels Per Acre More?  
(National Crop Improvement Service.)  
One of the important factors in increasing the yield is to obtain a good stand. Let us notice for a moment the possibility of a perfect stand.  
Hills per acre, three feet eight inches apart, 3,241.  
Number of stalks, three stalks per hill, 9,723.  
One-pound ear to the stalk, 9,723 pounds, or 143 bushels per acre.  
Three-fourth-pound ear to the stalk, 7,292 pounds, or 107 bushels per acre.  
One-half-pound ear to the stalk, 4,861 pounds, or 71 bushels per acre.  
Why is it that we fail to obtain a good stand? Some of the reasons for failure may be due to the neglect of the following:

1. Proper selection of seed corn.
2. Proper drying and storing of seed corn before freezing weather.
3. Proper selection of seed ears.
4. Germination test of seed ears.
5. Grading to even size of kernel.
6. Regulating planter to accurate dropping.

## PERFECT CORN.

[National Crop Improvement Service.]  
These are the results which every corn grower should strive to obtain:  
1. Early maturity.  
2. Large yield.  
3. Uniform color.  
4. Ears carrying size well to tip.  
5. Kernels holding full size well to tip of ear.  
6. Kernels holding size well down to cob.  
7. Butt and tip well filled out.  
8. Kernels firm on cob.  
9. Cob small.

## IMPORTING SEED CORN.

Many have the idea that, to start in right and grow good corn, they must send elsewhere and get some new fancy kind of seed. Those who do this are usually disappointed with their first crop or two. It takes some time for corn to become adapted to a change in climatic and soil conditions. For that reason, it is usually best to secure a variety of corn that has been successfully grown in the locality for a period of years.
