New Law Governing Sale of Weapons.

The last legislature passed a law effective on July 4th which forbids the sale of dirks, daggers, stiletos, metallic knuckles, sand bags and "skull crackers."

In regard to selling dangerous pocket weapons, it is provided that a retail dealer must secure a permit from the chief of police, mayor or sheriff to vend "any revolver, pistol or pocket billy or other weapons of a like character which can be concealed on the person;" and reports of sales must be made within 24 hours to the county recorder giving the name, age and occupation of the purchaser, and description, number and identification of the weapon sold. The county recorder shall keep a complete record of permits to sell or to carry weapons and a record of sales, which shall be open only to the peace officers.

Permits are to be issued to all peace officers and such other persons who in the judgment of the mayor or sheriff should be permitted to go armed with revolver or billy.

Mining companies, banks, railroad and express companies may obtain a general permit for any of their employees only while on duty and actual-

ly engaged in guarding any property.

Any person armed with a revolver, pistol or pocket billy shall, upon demand of an officer or any person, show his permit, and failure to promptly show the permit shall be deemed prima facie evidence of the violation of the act. No permit is issued for carrying a dirk, dagger or other similar weapon. No person under 14 years of age shall be allowed to carry firearms of any description.

Anyone making a purchase of a revolver or pistol and giving a fictitious name is guilty of a misdemeanor.

The permits for carrying are strictly for carrying "concealed" weapons; nothing is said about carrying them not concealed.

Penalties may run up to \$500 and two years in prison.

The provisions in regard to sales does not apply to wholesale dealers or jobbers

Get Rebate Without Receipt.

Receipts are not absolutely essential in order to recover from the railroads the excess passenger fair paid since the discontinuance of the 2-cent fare, July 1, 1911. According to the attorney general's office if a passenger can prove by competent witnesses that he took a certain trip and paid 3 cents a mile, or other evidence, he is entitled to recover all in excess of the 2-cent rate he paid.

Shippers will profit greatly as a result of the decree and the railroad commission is already making plans to distribute the rebates of which it has a record. The railroads since 1890 have filed complete schedules of their business, and it is up to the commission to collect the excess from the roads and pay the money. This will be a difficult task as many unlawful claims will undoubtedly be presented. All the excess unclaimed or undistributed within a year goes to the state according to law.

Do not sell your receipts. Have nothing to do with claim agents, but deal direct with either the railroad companies or the state. This is the warning that will likely be sent out next week by the state railway com-

mission in the matter of refunds made necessary by the recent railway rate decision.

The commission learned Saturday that speculators were at work picking up claims on the basis of 50 cents on the dollar, and the warning is for the purpose of discouraging the traffic. It is figured that there are at least \$5,000,000 of these claims awaiting settlement.—Austin Herald.
