

SHAKE HANDS IN BROTHERLY WAY

Men in Blue and Gray Mingle
at Gettysburg.

FORTY THOUSAND ON HAND

Army of Aged Warriors Appears United in Sentiment and Fact, as Foes of Fifty Years Ago March Together, Eat Together and Swap Stories Over Camp Fires—First Minnesota Receives an Ovation on Its Arrival.

Gettysburg, Pa., July 1.—Over the field of Gettysburg, where 150,000 men in blue and gray fought with the weapons of war fifty years ago, the soldiers of peace from the North and the South, the East and the West, trooped to the tented city of brown where they will live in the four days of semi-centennial celebration.

It was an army united in sentiment and united in fact, for the blue linked arms with the gray. They marched the dusty road together, they sat down at the same mess tables and talked over the war before the same camp fires.

If there was any rancor in any heart, any feeling of bitterness, it did not come to the surface and over the broad expanse of the "city" reunions of those who won and those who tried went on hour after hour.

Officials of the regular army in charge of the camp estimated that nearly 15,000 veterans came in, bringing the total close to 40,000, probably the greatest army that ever assembled on Gettysburg field after Lee and Meade left it to glory and to history.

The sun blazed just as fiercely as ever, but down from the Blue Ridge tumbled a lively little breeze that stirred the fading grass and cutting in the open tent flaps, carrying vigor to the tired veterans.

In consequence of this relief there were fewer prostrations and the surgeons at relief and hospital stations hope that the list of the sick and dead will be small.

The First Minnesota veterans, the command which suffered the greatest percentage of loss of any regiment in the Gettysburg battle, were greeted with cheers on their arrival here. The Minnesotans are accompanied by Governor Eberhart of that state.

Edgar A. Bigsley, a veteran of Wauwatosa, Wis., was found dead in his tent. This brings the death list to three.

DELAY ON CURRENCY BILL

House Committee Wants Time to Look Measure Over.

Washington July 1.—The speed of the smoothly geared legislative machinery planned to rush the administration currency bill through the house with dispatch was reduced at a conference of the Democratic members of the house banking and currency committee.

The majority members decided to allow themselves a week to think the bill over. They will meet again next Monday to plan the course of the measure through the committee, to discuss holding public hearings on the bill and making committee deliberations open to the public.

Meantime Chairman Glass was authorized to select an expert to advise with the committee. H. Parker Willis of New York may be the expert.

UNCLE SAM BUYS FOREST

Total Acreage of 113,909 Purchased by Government.

Washington, July 1.—The first forest upon the watershed of the Ohio river to be acquired for the government was approved for purchase by the national forestry reservation commission.

It is included in what is known as the Monongahela area, at the head of the Monongahela river, and embraces two tracts aggregating 29,567 acres, for which an average price of \$3.06 an acre is to be paid.

Four areas in all were approved, the total acreage being 113,909, the largest purchase ever passed upon by the commission at one time.

SUSPEND FLAX RATE RAISE

Twin Cities Affected by Order of Interstate Commerce Body.

Washington, July 1.—Increases in freight rates on flaxseed, ranging from 6 to 11½ cents a hundred pounds, from the Twin Cities and other Northwestern points to Missouri river destinations, were suspended by the interstate commerce commission until Oct. 29.

EXPERTS TO FIGHT CHOLERA

Department of Agriculture Will Aid Farmers in Indiana.

Washington, July 1.—Experts from the department of agriculture will go next week to Montgomery county, Indiana, to aid the farmers in stamping out cholera.

They will take with them some serum recently discovered by the department.

New York Jurist Becomes
Ambassador to Germany.



GERARD GETS GERMAN POST

Justice of New York Court Selected as Ambassador.

Washington, June 27.—Justice James W. Gerard of the New York state supreme court has been selected by President Wilson to be ambassador to Germany. Justice Gerard was originally slated for Spain.

The president has decided to nominate former Governor Benton McMillin of Tennessee for minister to Peru. An important post, not in the diplomatic service, is soon to be offered to Augustus Thomas, playwright. There is also talk of Maurice Francis Egan, minister to Denmark, being transferred to Spain.

School Building, Cresco, Iowa.

Sealed proposals will be received by B. F. Davis, Secretary of the School board of Cresco, Iowa, until 7 o'clock p. m., the 7th day of July, 1913, for the erection of a School building, according to plans and specification which may be seen at the Secretary's office at Cresco, Iowa, after the 24th day of June, 1913. Copies of the same may be obtained from J. H. Howe, Architect, of Cresco, Iowa, by remitting \$5.00 to him, plans to be returned to the Architect after the contract is awarded.

Contractors will be required to furnish a bond to be approved by the School board, for 50 per cent of the contract price, issued by a responsible security company, and drawn to protect the School board, sub-contractors, and material men, upon the approval of the contract.

Each bid must be submitted upon blanks furnished by the Architect, and must be accompanied by a certified check for an amount equal to two per cent of the bid submitted, made payable to the order of B. F. Davis, Secretary of the School Board; said amount to be forfeited in case the bidder receiving the award shall fail to execute the contract and furnish the bond above described within six days after notification of the acceptance of his bid.

The right is reserved by the School Board to reject any or all bids, and to waive any defects or informalities in any bid, if it be deemed to the interest of the School board to do so. All bids on outside of envelopes, "Contractor's Bid."
