ORDINANCE

An ordinance providing for a system of ornamental street lighting and for maintaining same for lighting purposes, and agreement with the Inter State Power Co., for the maintenance thereof, and fixing the time and prices to be paid for light so furnished

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cresco, Ia.

Sec. 1. That whereas, a number of ornamental iron lamp posts, known as electroliners have been placed or are being placed on Elm St. between the South line of Third Ave. East and West and South line of Second Ave., Southeast and Southwest, the same to be equipped with the necessary wires and other appliances to enable their operation for street lighting purposes.

Sec. 2. The City of Cresco agrees whenever the "electroliners" provided for in the first paragraph hereof, are in place and ready for lighting, that it will maintain same as a part of its street lighting system under the contract now in force made with R. M. Burdick, and to pay as full compensation on the following schedule:

1. One center light, 100 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp, burning from dusk to dawn, and four side lights, 60 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp, burning to 11:00 P. M., every night at \$4.00 per month, or all discontinued at 11:00 P. M., every night at \$3.50 per month, for each "Electroliner."

2. One center light, 60 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp, burning from dusk to dawn every night, and four side lights 60 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning until 11:00 P. M., every night at \$3.25 per month, or all discontinued at 11:00 P. M., every night at \$2.75 per month, for each "Electroliner."

3. One center light, 60 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp, burning from dusk to dawn every night and four side lights 40 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk until 11:00 P. M., every night at \$2.75 per month, or all discontinued at 11:00 P. M., every night at \$2.25 per month for each "electroliner" and the posts carrying one light only on the following schedule:

4. One center light, 150 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$2.50 per month or from dusk to 11:00 P. M., at \$1.75 per month for each "electroliner."

4. One center light, 100 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$1.75 per month or from dusk to 11:00 P. M. \$1.00 "or each "electroliner."

It being understood that the city shall have the right to select from the above schedules, either as to time of lighting or number of lamps kept lighted upon any or all of such electroliners, but is to maintain each of the electroliners under some one of the foregoing schedules, all of the conditions of the outstanding lighting contract to remain in full force and effect, except in so far as the same may be modified hereby and except further that the Interstate Power Company shall be required only to maintain the globes and lamps on such electroliners and to paint each of the posts at least once annually. The Interstate Power Co. shall have at its option fifteen days to make any changes from one schedule to another, after being notified by the city to do so.

Sec. 3. It is further ordained and agreed that the system and lighting hereinbefore provided for may be extended upon the streets to cover other portions of said Elm Street, or other streets in said city, upon the same terms and conditions herein provided for, and that the lighting now in use upon the streets so supplied or to which said lighting may afterwards be supplied is to be discontinued and the system, above provided is to be substituted thereafter.

It is further ordained and agreed that when the substitution has been made as above provided for and also in case any future substitution should be made that the city may discontinue any remaining arc lights and substitute for any which may be so discontinued and in place of each.

1st. one 450 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$8.00 per month, or

2nd. one 300 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$5.50 per month, or

3d. one 250 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$4.75 per month, or

4th. one 150 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to

dawn every night at \$3.00 per month, or

5th. one 100 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$2.00 per month, or

6th. one 60 Watts Multiple Mazda Lamp burning from dusk to dawn every night at \$1.25 per month, or

7th. one 100 Watts Series Mazda Lamp on moonlight schedule at \$1.50 per month, or

8th. one series Mazda Street Lamp 75 Watts Series Mazda Lamp on moonlight schedule at \$1.25 per month.

All in lieu of any amount provided for in the original agreement for arc lamps which may so be replaced, and same schedule to apply to any lamps other than arcs if any replaced.

Sec. 5. The said city is not required hereby and does not agree to substitute any or all of its arc lights, but has the right to do so and is to have the benefit of the reduced rate for any substitution so made.

OFFICIAL PUBLICATION

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the City Council of the City of Cresco, Iowa, held on the 7th day of July, 1913, there was introduced a resolution hereinafter set forth, and that by resolution of the council duly passed on said date, the said resolution hereinafter set forth will be considered by the City Council for passage at a meeting to be held in the council room in said city at 8:00 p.m. on the 18th day of August 1913, at which time the owners of property subject to assessment for the cost of the sewer contemplated by said resolution, may appear before said council and make objection to the contemplated improvement and to the passage of said proposed resolution, if any they have, the said resolution being as follows:

RESOLUTION OF NECESSITY.
 Be it resolved, By the City Council of the City of Cresco, Iowa, that it is deemed advisable and necessary to construct a certain sewer within said city, the location and terminal points of which are described as follows to-wit:

Commencing where the center line of the alley passing through block 11, Beadle & Strong's addition to Cresco, intersects the west line of Pine Place, thence northwesterly along the center line of said alley a distance of about 220 feet to an intersection of the east line of Third Street west, said sewer being known as an extension of Lateral Sewer No. 5. Said sewer to be constructed underground and in accordance with the plans and specifications furnished by the city; material and construction to be as follows: To be of vitrified sewer tile of ten (10) inch diameter laid in the excavation provided therefor; joints to be cemented with mortar of Portland cement and sand, and to be provided with a manhole, a flush tank, and other devices necessary to make a good sewer, and wherever it may be required and the plans direct, or the City hereinafter provides for, common agricultural tile shall also be laid in said opening for the purpose of drainage, to terminate either at the manhole or as the plans may direct.

That for the entire cost of said sewer it is proposed to assess as abutting property all the lots in said block 11, Beadle & Strong's addition to Cresco, except lots 6 and 7. All of said lots being platted to abut on said sewer; and it is proposed to assess as adjacent property lots 1, 2 and 4, block 12, Baldwin's addition to Cresco.

It is further provided that the person receiving the contract for the construction of said sewer shall be required to receive in payment for the entire cost thereof assessment certificates issued against the abutting and adjacent property, and shall be accepted by the Contractor at their face value.

Be it further Resolved, That the City Council will meet at 8: p. m. on the 18th day of August 1913, in the Council Room of said City for the purpose of considering objections to the passage of said proposed resolution, and the construction of said improvement, at which hearing the above resolution may be amended and passed or passed as proposed.

Be it further Resolved, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby, instructed to cause notice of the pendency of the above resolution, and the time at which said proposed resolution will be considered by this council and objections to the passage thereof heard, to be published as provided by law in the Cresco Plain Dealer, and Howard County Times, newspapers of general circulation published in the City of Cresco, Iowa.
