## IOWA STATE FAIR

AUGUST 20 TO 28 1913

### OFFICIAL PUBLICATION.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the City Council of the City of Cresco, Iowa, held on the 7th day of July, 1913, there was introduced a resolution hereinafter set forth, and that by resolution of the council duly passed on said date, the said resolution hereinafter set forth will be considered by the City Council for passage at a meeting to be held in the council room in said city at 8:00 p. m. on the 18th day of August 1913, at which time the owners of property subject to assessment for the cost of the sewer contemplated by said resolution, may appear before said council and make objection to the contemplated improvement and to the passage of said proposed resolution, if any they have, the said resolution being as follows:

#### RESOLUTION OF NECESSITY.

Be it resolved, By the City Council of the City of Cresco, Iowa, that it is deemed advisable and necessary to construct a certain sewer within said city, the location and terminal points of which are described as follows to-wit:

Commencing where the center line of the alley passing through block 11, Beadle & Strong's addition to Cresco, intersects the west line of Pine Place, thence northwesterly along the center line of said alley a distance of about 220 feet to an intersection of the east line of Third Street west, said sewer being known as an extension of Lateral Sewer No. 5. Said sewer to be constructed underground and in accordance with the plans and specifications furnished by the city; material and construction to be as follows: To be of vitrified sewer tile of ten (10) inch diameter, laid in the excavation provided therefore; joints to be cemented with mortar of Portland cement and sand; and to be provided with a manhole, a flush tank, and other devices necessary to make a good sewer, and wherever it may be required and the plans direct, or the City hereinafter provides for, common agricultural tie shall also be laid in said opening for the purpose of drainage, to terminate either at the manhole or as the plans may direct.

That for the entire cost of said sewer it is proposed to assess as abutting property all the lots in said block 11, Beadle & Strong's addition to Cresco, except lots 6 and 7. All of said lots being platted to abut on said sewer; and it is proposed to assess as adjacent property lots 1, 2, and 4, block 12, Baldwin's addition to Cresco.

It is further provided that the person receiving the contract for the construction of said sewer shall be required to receive in payment for the entire cost thereof assessment certificates issued against the abutting and adjacent property, and shall be accepted by the Contractor at their face value.

Be it further Resolved, That the City Council will meet at 8: p. m. on the 18th day of August 1913, in the Council Room of said City for the purpose of considering objections to the passage of said proposed resolution, and the construction of said improvement, at which hearing the above resolution may be amended and passed or passed as proposed.

Be it further Resolved, That the City Clerk be, and he is hereby, instructed to cause notice of the pendency of the above resolution, and the time at which said proposed resolution will be considered by this council and objections to the passage of said resolution, to be published as provided by law in the Cresco Plain Dealer, and Howard County Times, newspapers of general circulation published in the City of Cresco, Iowa.

### Fatal Auto Accident at Harmony.

Tallak Harstad is dead as the result of an automobile accident Thursday. This is in brief the sad news that came to our citizens a few hours ago. It sits us thinking seriously when accidents of this kind happen so near home. The facts in the case are this: Tallak Harstad and Chas. McCarty were going west this side of the flour mill a fair rate of speed when suddenly the steering apparatus failed to work and faster than man can think the car was in the ditch upside down. Chas. was pinned under the car but with the greatest exertion he managed to crawl out from under and found Tallak lying unconscious and bleeding a few feet away. Chas. hurriedly went for help and another car was sent to get the injured party.

Medical aid was immediately available and upon examination Tallak was found having sustained a broken collar bone, an ugly cut in the head and a crushing injury to the chest. He rallied for a few minutes but his internal injuries were such that recovery was impossible and he died at 3:15, about an hour and a half after the accident. He was conscious nearly to the last and seemed to suffer much pain.

The car which belonged to Oscar Hegg, was badly demolished and Chas. McCarty received only slight bruises and scratches. Tallak was only 25 years old and his sudden death seems indeed very sad. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Harstad and conducted a harness shop here.—Harmony News.

### Horrible Haying Accidents.

Tuesday near Lawler, Martin Wandersched, aged 15 years, was killed while hauling a load of hay. He and his father each had a load and were driving home, Martin's load partly slipped out on the horses which frightened them and threw him forward under the wheels. The wagon passed over him and he died from the injuries received.

Tuesday, near Gunder on the St. Olaf road, Will Shepherd was helping his brother harvest and was accompanied by his daughter Hattie. In the afternoon she brought a lunch out into the field, and held the horses by the bits while her father ate. The team became frightened and ran away. She hung on for awhile but finally dropped off and the machine passed over her, breaking one leg and mangling the other so it had to be amputated.

Hans Christopherson, near Postville, while assisting his son at haying, fell from a load of hay striking on his head and was injured quite badly.

In Allamakee county, Mrs. Henry Schroeder fell from a load of hay on her head, breaking her neck and killing her instantly. She was driving in with a load of hay when the load toppled over with her.

### A Queer Accident.

On Thursday Mrs. Dats Bigelow cleaned some articles of clothing with gasoline and poured the gasoline into an old cess pool near the house where they were in the habit of dumping rubbish and burning same. In the evening Mr. Bigelow thought he would burn the paper, lighted the same and stepped back. The explosion followed throwing him into the air and filling his eyes and face with gravel. Fortunately he was not close by or he would have been killed. It tore a hole in the ground six feet across. The theory advanced is that owing to the heavy air the heat of the day, the gasoline poured in in the forenoon did not evaporate, but accumulated gas all day long. We are glad to report that Mr. Bigelow is about town again. —New Hampton Tribune.

### Bad Mowing Machine Accident

Thursday afternoon Jesse Schoonmaker the 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Newton Schoonmaker of Castalia, who used to help his father here in the stock yards buying hogs, was terribly cut with a mowing machine, on the Elmer Rosa farm nine miles south west of Decorah. Jesse was mowing hay with an apparently gentle team, which for some unknown reason gave a jump which threw him from his seat in front of the sickle bar, the team running away and dragging him about twenty rods until the mower struck a fence, and the team became unfastened from the machine. The horses ran down the road towards home and Charles Daniels, who lives opposite the Rosa home, saw the team coming, and about the same time Mrs. Rosa saw them. She called Elmer who was in the barn and realizing an accident had happened Messrs Daniels and Rosa ran to the field where they found Jesse, the mower-jammed up against the fence and him under the sickle bar. Mr. Daniels and Rosa put the boy into Daniels' auto and made a record run to Decorah, where they took Jesse to Dr. Thomas' office. There Drs. Thomas, Jewell and Swezey spent about four hours dressing the wounds that required about 200 stitches.

He was badly cut on the head, and on his right side just under his arm and his right leg above the knee was terribly cut and bruised. He also had the thumb on his left hand cut off and the first finger was cut but may be saved. —Decorah Journal.
