**Flags Over all Public Buildings.**

At the last session of the legislature a law was passed making it obligatory to fly a flag over all of the public buildings of the state every week day when the weather does not prevent. Statute No. 244, Section 3, page 266, says: "That it shall be the duty of the custodians of all public buildings of the state of Iowa to raise over such buildings the flag of the United States of America upon every secular day when weather conditions are favorable and it shall be the duty of the board of public officers charged with the duty of providing for the supplies of every such building to provide in connection with other supplies a suitable flag for the purposes herein provided."
