Appreciated at Lansing.

Dr. D. T. Robertson, pastor of the Congregational church at our neighboring city of Cresco, and we should judge, not a minister of the kind who goes to his parishioners after the services and apologizes for what he may have said in his sermon—a preacher on the fence as it were—but a plain, blunt speaking Scotch divine who has a message and dares to tell the truth no matter what the consequences, spoke for nearly two hours Sunday evening on the "Mutation of a Dollar," and held the largest audience of the session spell-bound by his forceful oratory. Dr. Robertson has been on the Chautauqua platform for three years but is not regularly on the Redpath-Vawter circuit this season, having filled in a few dates only for them, and Lansing was fortunate in being one of them. He has lectured from the same platform with W. J. Bryan, who is just now in the limelight and attracting more attention than ever, and having traveled in company with the great commoner, has learned to know Mr. Bryan as a high minded Christian gentleman, and, although a republican, says that he will vote for him for President if he ever gets the chance again. Dr. Robertson went direct from here to the old home in New York state, of which he spoke so tenderly in his lecture, where he visits and does some Chautauqua work during the two months' vacation that is annually given him by his parishioners.—Lansing Journal.

Ammaretta J. Dixon was born in Westchester county, N. Y., March 20, 1849. Died August 10, 1913, aged 94 years, 4 months, 21 days. She was married to Charles Curtis Dec. 28, 1849, who preceded her to the better land in 1879. To this union two children were born, Jane Elizabeth and Smith, the latter dying when 6 years old. Her early life was spent in New York state, coming west to Orleans township, Winneshiek county, Iowa, with her husband in 1856, making that her home until the fall of 1901, when she moved to this city. She resided here until her death.

When she was 18 years of age she united with the Methodist Episcopal church at Round Ridge, Conn. At the time of her death she was still a loyal, faithful member of the church at Cresco.

Mother Curtis had lived on borrowed time for many days. She had been a great sufferer for some time. The infinite love and tenderness with which she was surrounded undoubtedly prolonged her days. She was always the same, patient and cheerful. Her Father's will was supreme to her. She talked frequently to her pastor regarding the future life. Death was simply a change to her. A home on earth was to be given up and the home in heaven was to be occupied.

The many family friends offer their sympathy in the sorrow that must come at the loss of a mother and friend.

The funeral services were conducted from the house by the Rev. B. W. Soper assisted by the Rev. John Gammons, also Rev. Shafer, and Rev. Bell of Waukon. Interment was in Oaklawn cemetery.

Bernardus Leferink, who has been in failing health for several months, passed away on Wednesday, August 6th, at the age of 76 years, 2 months and 11 days.
