Notice of Convention to Fix Salary of the Deputy Superintendent of Schools.

In compliance with Chapter 107 of the laws of the 35th General Assembly, notice is hereby given that a convention of representatives of the school corporations of Howard County, Iowa, will be held in the Court House at 2 o'clock p. m., Saturday, September 20, 1913, for the purpose of fixing the salary of the Deputy County Superintendent of Schools.

Each school township, city, town or village independent district and each independent consolidated district in the county shall be entitled to one vote.

Each school corporation shall be represented at said convention by the president of the school board, or in his absence or inability to act, by some member of such board, to be selected by the board.


