#### A Nine Foot Highway.

Rockford Register: In a recent issue of the Mason City Times a cement road nine feet wide was recommended as a possible solution of the permanent good roads problem on what are known as the main or county highways. True, a road of such width would preclude a whole lot of "scorching" by high power automobiles, particularly at times when the earth roadway at either side was muddy and rough, but such cement road would nevertheless go a long way towards meeting the greatest need which exists today for a hard and permanent highway--namely, ability to haul big loads of \$8.50 hogs and other produce to market, regardless of weather conditions. The chief argument that can be urged against a narrow highway of this character is the difficulty of two loaded vehicles passing each other. However, this could be solved as the same problem is solved on the stage coach roads in our western national parks by making the highway double width for a short distance at intervals of every few hundred feet. The team first reaching this passing place could side track and wait for the team approaching on the narrow section ahead. But this would only be necessary in case where rigs were loaded. If one were empty, the rule of the road could be held to as it is now, of giving the right of way to the loaded vehicles. It would be a fine thing if we could have cement or other permanent roads twenty-four feet or more wide, but since such a highway is not practicable the nine foot road offers a way out. At least, it is worthy of serious consideration.


