District Court in Session.

The term now in session will not be as long as anticipated, as several cases set for trial have been continued. Up to the time of going to press, but one jury case has been tried, the one of the Central Machine Co. vs. The Automatic Cream Ripener Co., a Chester concern, in which the former company sought to recover a balance of about \$360 due for making models and arranging for the manufacture of a cream ripener patented by a Chester butter maker, and in which other Chester men are interested. The defendants claimed an excessive overcharge for the work, but the jury found a verdict for practically the amount sought to be recovered.

As we go to press, a jury is being selected in the Frank Hess case. The grand jury was in session two days.
