IOWA NEWS BRIEFS

Waterloo will have a new vaudeville theater.

Cedar Rapids is talking of buying a fire engine.

A boy's band is being organized at Webster City.

Farmers in Tabor are being troubled by wolves.

Monticello has organized a booster commercial club.

The Perry Commercial club has offered a prize of \$25 for a slogan for Perry.

A new seven-story building, costing \$225,000, will be erected at Fort Dodge.

Plans are under way at Boone looking toward the better lighting of the city park.

Jay Long, a Fort Dodge saloon man, was fined \$500 for selling liquor to a minor.

It is estimated that fully 10,000 attended the Webster county fair at Fort Dodge.

Thomas Jefferson Kelley, aged 73, a veteran of the civil war, died at his home in Wilton.

Thieves entering the M. & St. L. railway company's office at Eldora got away with \$35.

Dr. N. M. Repp of Perry has been appointed assistant state veterinarian by Governor Clarke.

The new extension of the Waterloo, Cedar Falls & Northern was opened to Brandon recently.

Plans are on foot in Dubuque to establish a fair such as is held in Des Moines and Sioux City.

In a free for all fight at Lehigh recently a young man named Humphrey was seriously injured.

Mr. and Mrs. Ira Nash of Pottsville have just celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of their marriage.

The Quaker Oats plant at Fort Dodge has let the contract for the erection of a \$10,000 addition.

According to the law governing the LeMars schools, boys will have to quit smoking or leave the school.

A new tank car with a capacity of 40,000 fish will distribute fish to the various lakes and streams in the state.

The inmates at the Fort Madison penitentiary are having more work done to their teeth than ever before.

Lucas Strube, a guard at the Anamosa penitentiary, was slugged by an insane convict. The convict was a negro.

Jay Chatham, superintendent of the Iowa City water company, died at his home in Iowa City at the age of 56 years.

Frank Dundon, a Great Western switchman at Des Moines, fell in front of a string of box cars and was literally cut to pieces.

The body of W. J. Glade of Winfield was recovered from the Mississippi river, where he fell in while walking along the dock.

Jay Chatham of Iowa City, superintendent of the Iowa City Water Co., and for thirty years connected with that company, died.

Fred H. Taft, at one time editor of the Hardin County Citizen, is a judge in a juvenile court in Los Angeles. His salary is \$6,000 per year.

Sheriff W. E. Knox of Ottumwa has received a reward of \$150 for the apprehension of Margaret Luka, who disappeared from Des Moines.

The annual report of the state mine inspector shows one-half million more tons of coal were mined last year than in any previous year in Iowa.

A band stand collapsed at Fort Dodge during the races and the fifty people occupying it were thrown to the ground. No one was seriously hurt.

Notice has been served on business men and property owners at Boone that they must clean up parkings and remove all obstructions from sidewalks.

In the district court at Eldora, Howard Sherman was convicted of murdering his infant baby on March 6th. The jury recommended a life sentence.

The Howard hotel at Sheldon has changed hands, the new proprietor being G. W. Macoy. The former owner, J. J. Stuck, has removed to Sioux City.

The official board of the M. E. church at Fort Dodge has passed a resolution to the effect that they believe E. O. Fritz, indicted by the grand jury for forgery, is innocent.

The John Kock farm, three miles northeast of Rockford, was visited by a disastrous fire, which destroyed the barn, forty tons of hay, silo, two horses, machinery and corn cribs. No one knows how it started.

Julius Jones, proprietor of the Highland Park livery barn, Des Moines, was robbed of \$900. Jones kept the money in a trunk in the loft of his barn in a room that had been fitted up as a sleeping apartment.

Rev. John Garland of Parkersburg and Miss Maggie Ward of Dubuque were arrested at Waterloo on a charge of disorderly conduct. It is alleged that the couple have been staying at one of the hotels in that place.

The explosion of a presto-lite tank at Malvern did much damage to a garage. A. Peterson, who was holding the tank when it exploded, escaped with but few burns. The skylight and windows of the building were broken.

Louis Lawrence, a prosperous farmer of Monticello, living four miles north of town, claims to be the champion corn grower of the section. He says that he has ninety-five acres of corn which will average seventy-five bushels to the acre.

Apparently dazzled by the brightness of electric lights while flying low, a large flock of wild canaries descended in Keokuk while in flight from north to south.

The Dundee Savings bank of Manchester has closed its doors. The institution is in the hands of the state bank examiners. The exact condition of the funds is unknown.

The Commercial club of Iowa City entertained Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Arctic explorer. Dr. Cook lectured in defense of his good name and to tell of his explorations.

The new \$12,000 bath house and a \$5,000 greenhouse will be erected by the park department of Des Moines this fall. This was decided by Mayor Hanna and Councilman Roe.

Walter Blink, arrested at Perry for having stolen \$120 from the man for whom he was working, was fined \$150 and drew a jail sentence of forty-five days at Anamosa.

The new member of the state board of control was named by Gov. Clarke in the person of James H. McConlogue, a lawyer, of Mason City. He succeeds the late John F. Wade.

Owen Ford, a colored man from Clarion, was arraigned before United States Commissioner Martin on the charge of bootlegging. He was bound over to the grand jury under \$200 bonds. Not having the \$200, he was remanded to the county jail.

Taking out a \$3,000 insurance policy and dying three days later was the fate which befell Isaac W. Leamon of Bremer county. Leamon was killed in an auto accident, and his family knew nothing of the accident insurance until notified by the agent.

Two young Germans of Denison had a narrow escape from death when the horse they were driving became unmanageable and dashed toward a fast moving Northwestern train. Just before reaching the engine the two men jumped, but the horse was instantly killed.

William Deerfoot, the Cherokee Indian who shot his wife in Iowa City, is on trial, charged with murder in the first degree. A jury was secured easily. The outcome of the trial depends upon the laying of the guilt for the first shot. Deerfoot claims his wife fired first.

The second trial of J. T. McCaskill, this time on a charge of manslaughter, will commence November 4. Defendant has been at liberty on \$8,000 bonds. McCaskill is charged with killing Henry Phillips, a wealthy farmer, in a quarrel over the delivery of a sewing machine.

Henry Shannon, the Runnells youth who attempted to kill his sweetheart because she refused to marry him, has been convicted of murderous assault and given a five years' term in the Anamosa reformatory. Miss Ethel Mell, the girl he wounded, says she will wait until he is released.

Dick Scott of Macedonia while doing chores received a kick from a vicious horse, which rendered him unconscious and inflicted a cut on the chin which exposed the lower jawbone, and required several stitches to close. Dick is an unfortunate bop and has received more than his share of injuries.

The four wholesale ice cream dealers in Davenport against whom charges of food adulteration were filed by the state dairy and food commission through P. W. Crowley, state chemist, have pleaded guilty and been given nominal fines. The cream sold did not contain the required per cent of butter fat.

L. S. Woosay of Webster City has filed suit in the district court asking judgment against the Illinois Central Railroad company for \$10,000. He alleges he was riding to Chicago in the caboose of a stock train and that while the train was going forty miles an hour it stopped suddenly, throwing him against a redhot stove.

Mrs. Ed Pendleton and James Robertson were arrested on a statutory charge at Van and brought back to LeMars by Sheriff Maxwell. Both are in jail. Mrs. Pendleton is the wife of a well known farmer living in the west of the county and is the mother of seven children. She is alleged to have eloped with Robertson two weeks ago.

A timely telephone call at the Phi Alpha Delta fraternity house at Iowa City averted a loss of \$400 worth of silverware. A burglar had entered, got out the silverware and was about to pack it in an improvised sack when the telephone rang and one of the fraternity men went downstairs to answer the call. The burglar dropped his loot and fled.

A distressing accident occurred on the Zene Talcott farm south of Williams when a young man by the name of Davis, working with a silo cutter on the place, in some manner lost the ends of the fingers on one hand. He was brought at once to Webster City and operated upon at the local hospital. This is indeed an unfortunate accident for the young man.

The best prices so far this season were obtained at the Peterson Brothers' sale on the F. D. Pierce farm west of Cedar Falls. Twenty grade cows brought \$2,600 and thirty-four cows and heifers brought \$43,581. The top price for a cow was \$190. Buyers from Marshalltown, Boone and Omaha were in attendance and picked up most of the offerings.

The first application of the new law to prevent transient merchants from operating in the smaller towns was made in Dallas county. D. Bloom and J. Elper, together with Jim Patten, of Woodward, were arrested and brought to Perry to appear in the superior court. Patten is the owner of the building in which the other men had placed a stock of clothing.
