Did a Big Business.

Cresco people are mighty show hungry and as a result the two weeks' engagement of Frank E. Long was unparalleled for financial results. The receipts for the first week were nearly \$1,100, and including the proceeds of the Saturday matinee, \$68.75, which was donated to the Oak Lawn Cemetery Association, the second week's receipts were over \$600. On Saturday night there were 740 paid admissions in the house. The ordinary repertoire company considers \$60 to \$70 a good nightly average for a week's stand, but the Long engagement averaged about \$140 per day for a two weeks' engagement. Last year, Mr. Long's receipts here were \$920 for the week. Move for An Opera House.

The presence in our city of the Frank E. Long Company aroused such a sentiment for an opera house or auditorium of some kind, that the Commercial Club met Sunday afternoon, so as to be able to hear from Mr. Long his opinion of the needs of the city, and formulate some plan for providing some building adequate for the needs of the city. Mr. Long could give no definite information as to cost of building, but advised an opera house situated so that store rooms in the building could be rented and produce an income sufficient to maintain the insurance, taxes and other running expenses of the building. He also suggested building one with a large seating capacity, but free from architectural "frills" which tied up a lot of money which brought no returns, and recommended that the Commercial Club get in touch with a gentleman named Cox, of Estherville, Iowa, who was a practical man in planning opera houses suitable for the smaller cities.

After some discussion, it was decided to solicit stock subscriptions to the amount of \$25,000 at least, and F. A. Huber, Ed Farnsworth and W. H. Tillson were appointed a committee to do so, and from the few present, \$5,400 in subscriptions was promised, including two \$1,000 subscriptions, and the committee were assured of at least two more of a like amount.

It is now planned to hold a big booster meeting in about two weeks, where every man and woman in Cresco and vicinity will be asked to attend and give expression to their views, and listen to Mr. Cox or some other practical planner and builder of opera houses.

Chautauqua Assured for Next Season.

President Graham, of the Redpath-Vawter System, was in Cresco on Wednesday to meet with the directors of the Commercial Club to arrange for a Chautauqua at Cresco for next season, and as a result a contract was closed for a seven-day session at a guarantee of \$1,400 in season ticket sales. The Redpath people promise new talent and a date about two weeks earlier than that of this year which will accommodate the farmer patrons greatly.

A One Week Session of Court.

The work of the October term of the District Court closed Saturday evening after a long day's work.

When our last issue went to press the case of the State against F. A. Hess was on trial. The case was given to the jury on Friday and a verdict of not guilty was returned after less than an hour's deliberation.

Bud Hallman was tried and found guilty of the illegal sale of liquor, while Geo. Chryst, tried for the same crime, was found not guilty by a jury. Chryst was not represented by counsel and the jury was evidently influenced in its verdict by sympathy for the defendant, for the evidence and the judge's instructions called for a verdict of guilty.

Following are the cases disposed of in addition to those above during the last three days of the session.

Rebecca Reitz vs Wm. Reitz—Bonds of matrimony dissolved on account of willful desertion. Judgment against defendant for \$700 alimony. Neither party to marry within one year.

Mrs. Maud Holbrook and John McCook vs Eva McCook—Petition for guardian dismissed and costs paid.

M. M. Johnson vs G. T. Watros and W. A. Glass—Dismissed as to G. T. Watros.

H. L. Spaulding vs Rose Ann Hambleton—Dismissed.

J. P. Lyman vs H. G. Sutton—Case withdrawn by W. E. Peavy.

H. L. Spaulding and D. J. O'Donnell vs L. J. Rowell—Default against Louise French, O. C. Wilkerson and G. F. Hart.

Mary Montague vs C. M. Montague—Divorce granted and plaintiff granted \$1000 alimony. Plaintiff to have custody of minor children. Neither party to marry within one year.

Lizzie B. Cleghorn vs Will E. Cleghorn—Defendant withdraws answer and cross petition. Default against defendant. Bonds of matrimony dissolved.

Gottfried Lienhard vs John Slifka—Judgment for plaintiff for \$20 and costs.

Application of W. F. Scholz, registered pharmacist, to buy, keep and sell intoxicating liquors for medicinal purposes, granted.

Ben Offen vs B. E. Offen—Judgment against defendant for \$260.

Mrs. Augusta Jones vs John Hoffman—Decree quieting title to premises described.

Geo. Smith vs E. D. McWilliams—Adjudged plaintiff is the owner and en-

titled to present ownership of property described in petition.

O. J. Hellen vs John Oleon Hellen—Adjudged that defendant is of unsound mind. Gilbert H. Melaas appointed permanent guardian.

Edwin H. Betts vs J. P. Flynn et al—Judgment against all defendants for \$377.60.
