GOVERNOR IS OUSTED

Sulzer Removed by Vote of 43 to 12.

DROPS FOUR ARTICLES

High Court Unanimously Rules Out Last Half of the Charges.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 18.—William Sulzer is no longer governor of the state of New York. The high court of impeachment, by a vote of 43 to 12, has removed him from office. Senator Wende and Judge Cullen excused themselves from voting.

The proposal to disqualify Sulzer from ever again holding a place of honor or trust in the state was voted down unanimously with the exception that Judge Cullen again did not vote. Prior to the vote on his disqualification and removal the last four articles of the impeachment charges, 5, 6, 7 and 8, unanimously were voted out.

Martin H. Glynn of Albany, the acting governor, became governor. Robert F. Wagner of New York, majority leader of the senate, became lieutenant governor.

The vote on articles 1 and 2 was 39 to 18, a bare two-thirds majority. The former article charges that the governor falsified his statement of campaign contributions, the latter that he committed perjury in so doing.

The vote on article 3, which charges the governor bribed witnesses to withhold testimony from the Frawley investigating committee, was unanimous in favor of the governor.

The vote on article 4 was 43 to 14, six members changing their votes on articles 1 and 2 from "not guilty" to "guilty" and two from "guilty" to "not guilty." This article charges that the governor suppressed evidence by means of threats to keep witnesses from testifying. Among those was Duncon W. Peck, state superintendent of public works, who testified that the governor had asked him to commit perjury.

TRIAL A POLITICAL LYNCHING

Deposed Governor of New York Flays Tammany Chief.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 18.—William Sulzer, deposed governor of New York, issued a statement in which he declared he had been removed by "Murphy's high court of infamy."

"Murphy controlled the assembly and ordered the impeachment," he said. "He controlled most of the members of the court and dictated procedure and wrote the judgment. He was the judge and jury; the prosecutor and the bailiff."

Sulzer declared that his trial was a "political lynching as far as the Tammany part of the court was concerned—the confirmation of a deep laid political conspiracy to oust me from office."

Mr. Sulzer's long awaited statement characterized the secret sessions of the court as "star chamber proceedings, where the enemies of the state could work for my conviction undiscovered."

He asserted he had not taken the stand in his own defense because he realized that his story attacking the Tammany leader would be ruled out.

BEGINS AT BOTTOM AGAIN

SUPPORTS MURDER THEORY

Jealousy Also Feature of Testimony at Trial of Mrs. Eaton.

Plymouth, Mass., Oct. 18.—Medical testimony intended to establish that Rear Admiral Joseph G. Eaton was murdered by poisoning and evidence of his wife's jealousy were introduced by the state in the trial of Mrs. Jennie May Eaton.

Dr. Joseph G. Frame, the family physician, told of attending the admiral the day before he died.

Miss Grace Bryan Howard and Miss Bessie R. Collamore testified that Mrs. Eaton had asked them to accuse the admiral of having tried to flirt with them. Neither had been annoyed by attentions from the admiral, they said.

Friends Urging Him to

URGE LORIMER FOR SENATE

Petition Asks Expelled Solon to Be Candidate Again.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—A petition to former United States Senator William Lorimer asking him to be a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator next spring was circulated here.

The place for which Lorimer was asked to run is the senatorship to be vacated at the expiration of the term of Senator Sherman, who was elected to fill the vacancy caused when the senate held that Lorimer had not been properly elected to his seat.

Sulzer will go to New York to begin a campaign. He plans to speak day and night up to election time. After that he will accept some lecture engagements up to the first of January. His promise is to make the "fur fly" if he is made an assemblyman.

TEN YEARS FOR AUTO THIEF

Joy Riding Made Costly Sport at Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Oct. 21.—The extreme penalty for grand larceny—ten years in the penitentiary—was imposed by Judge Willis upon G. S. Graham, who was convicted of having stolen an automobile for a joy ride.

"The joy riding thief is a menace to the public," said the court. "In the future all such thieves convicted in this court will be sentenced to ten years in prison."

STRAY BULLET FATAL

Kittanning, Pa., Oct. 21.—Mrs. Jack Derice was killed instantly as she entered a room at her home in Yatesboro, near here. Charles Cameratti and Carl Dimetry were shooting at each other following a quarrel, when Mrs. Derice appeared and a stray bullet struck her. Cameratti was arrested.

PROMINENT WOMAN FREED

Supreme Court Sets Mrs. Randall Fitzhugh at Liberty.

New York, Oct. 21.—Mrs. Randall Fitzhugh, a member of an old and prominent Virginia family, was set free by Justice Cavegan in the supreme court on a suspended sentence after having pleaded guilty a few days ago to the theft of a gold mesh bag and a gold bracelet.

It was said that relatives would take her to Washington, D. C. She has been in prison nearly seven months and is in broken health.
