IOWA NEWS BRIEFS

It will take \$60,000 to put the Perry water works in shape.

Washington Hoblet, a morphine fiend, committed suicide at Newton.

All telephone wires and cables will be placed underground at Anamosa.

Ralph Carrigan, aged 9, was drowned in a mill race at Cedar Rapids.

Cedar Rapids has put the ban on motorcycles built for one, carrying two.

Two automobiles, livery barn and stock was destroyed in a fire at Winterset.

Anton Fischer, of Dubuque, committed suicide by shooting. He was a saloonman.

Bad negroes at Waterloo were being told by the city that they must either be good or leave.

Will Glenn, of Shenandoah, lost parts of four fingers in an asphalt manufacturing plant.

State Fish and Game Warden Hinchshaw is placing fish in Clear Lake, selected from the bayous at Sabula.

M. C. Nelson, of Waterloo, sold a Cedar river pearl to William Strohmeyer of Andalusia, Ill., for \$1,500.

The 10 months old baby of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stottlemeyer was drowned by falling into a slop pail at Lenox.

Tama school bonds, an issue of \$60,000, for building a new school building, were sold to a Davenport firm.

It is estimated that \$1,000,000 worth of barns have been destroyed in Iowa since July. This includes contents.

A valuable pearl was found at Waterloo in the Cedar river by M. C. Nelson. The pearl was sold for \$1,500.

The 200-acre farm at Cherokee, known as the J. M. Hawn land, was sold at referee sale for \$225 an acre.

In order to obviate eye strain the children in the public schools at Waterloo are using yellow scratch paper.

J. M. Junkin, a prominent attorney at Red Oak, dropped dead in his law office. Death was due to heart failure.

The Waterloo Cattle congress has opened in a blaze of glory. This is the thirty-seventh annual convention.

The Iowa university debating squad has been divided into teams and will debate Illinois and Nebraska this winter.

Miss Ruthy Howes, of New Albin, a dwarf, is dead at the age of 66 years. She was 37 inches tall and weighed 60 pounds.

About \$2,000 in gold, silver and greenbacks was unearthed in a cellar at Winthrop. The money was buried in a tin can.

Despondent owing to poor health, Thos. Carroll, of Marshalltown, attempted suicide by cutting his throat with a razor.

C. W. Allen, an old resident of Sac City, was killed at Portland recently by being thrown under the wheels of a moving train.

One thousand five hundred bushels of apples raised on three acres of land near Waterloo, brought \$1 a bushel, or \$500 an acre.

Henry Price, a colored hotel porter of Iowa City, fell from a passenger train during an epileptic fit and was ground to death.

The Quinn Wire and Iron Works buildings at Boone burned with a loss of about \$75,000. It was partly covered by insurance.

Thirty carloads of sugar beets have arrived at Waverly at the opening of the factory. About 300 people are employed in the factory.

Searchers recovered the body of Kenneth G. Lyberger, of Osage, who was drowned at Iowa City by the overturning of a canoe.

According to the department of pharmacy at the Iowa state university the demand for women pharmacists is so great that it cannot be filled.

In attempting to test a new fire escape at the Depot hotel at Hawarden, Miss Lulu Everett was badly injured. When two stories from the ground she became frightened and let go, injuring her hip and spine.

Fish in large numbers were being killed at Mason City by a substance floating in the water which resembled creosote. The matter was called to the state fish commissioner and an immediate remedy applied.

Hal Wells, of Des Moines, when almost in sight of Council Bluffs, the goal in his auto race across the state, was forced to give up on account of rain. Wells returned to Des Moines and will make another try.

The program for the annual Baptist state convention, to be held at Waterloo, has been issued. Five hundred ministers and lay members will attend. J. R. Vaughan, of Waterloo, will give the president's address.

The mayor of Manchester and the secretary of a carnival company were called on the carpet at that place by the grand jury for allowing gambling and naughty side shows to operate. Manchester has had her last carnival.

John Crosby, of Humboldt, created a disturbance in that city recently when he struck at Bob Spear with an ax because the latter refused to let him drink up an entire bottle of whisky. Spears' arm was broken and badly lacerated.

Maggie Moomaw, of Newton, 60 years of age, was granted a divorce from her husband, Amos Moomaw. The case is remarkable because of the age of the plaintiff and the fact she had not lived with her husband for twenty years.

A number of Cedar Falls high school boys found a quantity of elderberry wine in a barn and proceeded to imbibe too freely. The young men's appearance in the school was such as to bring forth a severe reprimand from the superintendent.

One of seven hobos was killed and his companions more or less injured when a double header Milwaukee freight train was wrecked at Manning. Section hands had taken up a rail and the engineer failed to see the flags in time to stop the heavy train.

Mayor Clayton Baker, of Manilla, has been busy cleaning up the town. He succeeded in getting four bootleggers and gave each one a stiff fine. The mayor led the officers in a raid on the gamblers and caught seven. Five of them pleaded guilty and were fined from \$50 to \$200.

Declaring that the Pullman company is using its power and wealth to prevent him from obtaining justice through the courts, Frank J. Laughlin, a conductor, filed his answer in federal court at Council Bluffs to the action brought by him to recover \$30,000 for personal injuries.

Perry's new federal building, for which an appropriation of \$65,000 was made by congress two years ago, will be built next year. Plans have arrived from the government architects and will be submitted by the postmaster to the contractors. Bids for the building will be opened.

Clarence, the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Tinkhom, of Rickardsville, had his left leg broken. Clarence and two other boys were driving down a hill and when over a gutter he fell off the seat. A surgeon was called who set the limb and the young man is getting along nicely at present.

What proved to be the best cattle sale held in Jones county for many years was that of Miller & Northey, at Morely, who sold at public sale fifty-six head of Shorthorn cattle at an average of \$210 per head. The top of the sale went to J. G. Westrope, of Harlan, when he purchased Roan Lady 109467 for \$510.

George Dunker, of Muscatine, was badly injured at his home when he fell from a tree and the ladder on which he was standing fell on him. He was not injured by his fall from the ladder but while lying prostrate on the ground the ladder fell on him. He suffered the fracture of three ribs and other severe injuries.

Because 14-year-old Sabina Orucci, of Des Moines, did not want to leave home and mother and did want to continue her studies in the public schools, she refused to marry Frank Mears. Even the gift of a white silk wedding dress and jewels could not bribe her into matrimony. The license was returned to the county clerk.

Rev. W. W. Smith, of Hastings, Neb., has been secured to aid in raising the additional endowment fund for Parsons College of Fairfield. He is on the ground now and will probably remove his family to that city within a short time. Mr. Smith has been engaged in like work at Hastings, where \$100,000 was recently raised.

A big panther has made his appearance down in the forest about three miles east of Rickardsville and some think it is the same one that was near Dubuque in Mosleam township a few weeks ago. The panther was seen the first time by two farmers of this section who were coming home from Dubuque, and measures about six feet in length.

Miss Sarah Moore, aged 71, whose hearing is defective, was knocked from a railroad crossing in Cantril by the east-bound passenger train. Her head was cut but the skull is not fractured, one rib broken and she was otherwise badly bruised. Her recovery is doubtful. She is a sister of J. R. Moore, of this place, and of Mrs. Morgan Stewart, of Milton.

A car belonging to T. W. Thompson of Albia was completely consumed by fire. The auto was driven by John Zaring, who was accompanied by his sister and another young lady. They were returning from Eddyville and about three miles from Albia the car stopped. An examination revealed a spark of fire and the occupants made good their escape before the explosion occurred.


