The Administration Endorsed.

At the state elections held on Tuesday, the administration of President Wilson was given a great endorsement by the election of democratic governors in Massachusetts, New Jersey and Virginia and a democratic senator from Maryland. In scattering congressional elections the democrats were victors in every instance.

In Massachusetts, a manufacturing state, the present governor, Foss, a Republican elected as a Democrat, and who criticized the administration's tariff bill severely and run for governor as an independent, ran a poor fourth; Walsh, Democrat, winning by over 50,000 in a campaign in which the tariff and the currency measures were the issues.

In New Jersey, J. S. Fielder, a personal friend of Pres. Wilson, was elected, and in Maryland, Lee, democrat, was elected senator, and in both these states Secretary Bryan campaigned for the successful men.

In New York City Tammany was overwhelmingly defeated by the fusion forces, who elected for mayor, Mitchell, an appointee of Pres. Wilson, who resigned his office as collector of customs to lead the fight against Murphy. Sulzer, the deposed governor of New York, goes to the state assembly, elected on the progressive ticket by a vote as large as the total of both his opponents.

Riceville Man Injured in Auto Wreck.

An automobile party composed of August Apperling, Herman Webbering and son Henry from Waterloo, and Jerry Cashman of Riceville, met with a serious accident Monday about noon, resulting fatally to the former and with grave injury to the three latter.

Mr. Cashman had some acquaintance with the Webberings, he having bought stock with or for them. This acquaintance led the gentleman to request Mr. Cashman to accompany them in looking over the country with a view to buying a farm.

They started out Monday in a new Rambler car driven by the elder Webbering, Mr. Cashman occupying the front seat with him and the other two the back seat. On approaching a bridge six miles north of LeRoy the driver, Mr. Webbering, apparently turned around in his seat calling attention to a certain piece of land. In so doing, the car which had mounted the bridge was running close to its edge, Mr. Cashman called the attention of the driver's attention to this fact and the car, which was going at a fair rate of speed was turned too far to the other side and went into the ditch off the opposite approach and the passengers all thrown out.

The accident was noticed by others who took the men to LeRoy. Mr. Apperling, who was about 70 years old, seemed the least injured at the time of the accident and got up and was able to walk, but died a few hours after he was taken to LeRoy.

Both Webberings suffered broken ribs and the younger man had a wrist broken in addition.

Mr. Cashman, who was brought home Monday evening appears the least injured of any, but he is badly bruised up about the head and one leg and seems to be suffering internal injuries. The car was badly smashed to pieces—Riceville Recorder.

On Tuesday evening, Joe Fessenden and Charles Hollister were unloading hay at the former's barn, when a lighted lantern was overturned setting fire to the hay, but in spite of its rapid spread, Mr. Fessenden got out his horses and equipment. The fire department, by prompt work, saved the fire from spreading to other barns in the neighborhood, but the Fessenden barn was a total loss.
