**RESENT ATTACK ON PRESIDENT**

Democratic Senators Take Cummins to Task.

**IOWAN MAKES EXPLANATION**

Senator Martine Quotes Cummins as Having Said There Was "No Moral Difference Between Huerta and the Man in the White House"—Iowan Says He Only Referred to the Office.

Washington, Nov. 4.—Senator Martin took Senator Cummins to task for some of the latter's speeches in the New Jersey campaign in which Mr. Cummins was quoted as having said there was "no moral difference between Huerta and the man in the White House," and having assailed "the big stick methods in connection with the tariff bill."

Mr. Martine characterized the references as "absurd, ridiculous and ungenerous."

Mr. Cummins declared he had not discussed President Wilson in such a vein.

"I spoke of the office, not of the man," he said. "I did severely criticize the tendency of the executive to override the legislative branch of the government."

"Does the senator mean to repeat his comparison between Huerta and President Wilson?" demanded Senator Martine.

Cummins Explains Utterance.

"Of course, I did not say that," returned Senator Cummins. "But I did say, and I will say again, that I would just as soon have my will as a member of congress overcome by an armed soldier as by any other influence from the executive. There is no difference."

Senators Owen and Williams defended the president, the former declaring that he occupied the White House with "more modesty than was usual." Senator Williams declared that it "was slander and calumny" to say that the president had used patronage to influence legislation and challenged any senator to prove that charge.

Speaker Clark issued a statement defending the president's course and declaring there was no mystery about the making of the tariff bill.

"The president," he said, "did his part; the house did its part; the senate did its part; we all stood together and worked together; we made the best tariff bill in half a century—hence these tears."

**ARKANSAS MILITIA IN BAD**

Government Notifies State's Executive of No Further Aid.

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 4.—Governor Hayes received notification from Assistant Secretary of War Breckinridge that the United States government will give no further aid to the Arkansas militia.

As the last legislature refused to make an appropriation for the militia this ends practically all hope of preserving its organization.

Captain Sloan, militia inspector for Arkansas, a year ago reported that \$54,000 worth of equipment lent to the Arkansas national guard was missing.

**ALLEGED BLACKMAILER HELD**

Utah Railroad and Mining Man Accused of Extorting Money.

Ogden, Utah, Nov. 4.—Myron A. Smith, railroad and mining man, was arrested by federal officers and held to appear before Commissioner Corn at Ogden on Thursday to answer to the charge of blackmailing Mrs. Ralph E. Bristol through a letter sent April 2 and attempting to blackmail David C. Eccles by a letter sent Oct. 1.

Blackmailers obtained \$500 from Mrs. Bristol and D. C. Eccles for \$1,000. The home of Leroy Eccles was dynamited Saturday night by the blackmailers.

**ENGINEER'S INJURIES FATAL**

Train's Own Vibration Caused Huge Rock to Fall on Track.

La Crosse, Wis., Nov. 4.—Engineer J. M. Pratt of the southbound Burlington train, which was wrecked three miles south of Genoa, died at the Lutheran hospital here. One side of Pratt's face was crushed in. He is believed to have struck a stump or rock in jumping.

That vibrations of its own creation loosened the face of a towering cliff and sent down the fifty-ton rock which wrecked the train is the theory formed by railroad experts.


**EXECUTE SPANISH OFFICER**

Captain Manuel Sanchez Had Been Found Guilty of Murder.

Madrid, Spain, Nov. 4.—A firing squad of Spanish troops at dawn executed Captain Manuel Sanchez, a Spanish army officer found guilty by a court martial of the murder of Don Garcia Jalon, a wealthy land owner, last May.

Luisa Sanchez, said to be his daughter, was sentenced to twelve years' imprisonment as his accomplice.

**HENRY S. BOUTELL.**  
 Chairman of Board to Arbitrate Labor Dispute.



**BOUTELL CHIEF MEDIATOR**

Former Illinois Representative to Help Settle Labor Dispute.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Henry S. Boutell, former congressman from Illinois, was selected chairman of the board which will arbitrate the differences between officials and the conductors and trainmen of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad.

Five thousand of the road's employees are demanding wage increases and better working hours. The first hearing will be held here.

**WOMAN DENIES SHE EVER KNEW FUNK**

Is Not Spared Because of Her Weakened Condition.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Josephine Henning arose from a sick bed again to deny that she ever knew Clarence S. Funk, former general manager of the International Harvester company, and that she never ever saw him until she was confronted by him in court ten days ago.

In her cross-examination in the trial of Attorney Daniel Donahoe and Isaac Stiefel for conspiracy to defame Mr. Funk she was not spared because of her weakened condition.

Counsel for the defense endeavored to obtain admissions from her, but she repeatedly denied she ever had told anybody that she had gone anywhere with Mr. Funk.

Mrs. Henning was followed on the stand by her husband, who asserted that he was induced to bring suit charging Mr. Funk with alienating his wife's affections on Donahoe's promise that nothing would ever come of it and that he would be well taken care of.

**BYSTANDER FATALLY SHOT**

Strike Sympathizers Attack Car Barns at Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, Nov. 4.—The third day of the strike of the Indianapolis Traction and Terminal company's employees ended with no attempt to move cars.

Charges that politics has caused the police to fail to give the traction company sufficient protection to run its cars were made by candidates for office, while an effort of Sheriff Porteus to swear in 200 citizen deputies resulted in the charge being made that he had summoned the men chiefly to reduce their activities at the polls.

Thomas Carlton, a chauffeur, was shot and fatally wounded while watching a crowd of sympathizers attack the Louisiana car barns, where the strikebreakers are housed.

**SLIDE BURIES BOYS.**

Beloit, Wis., Nov. 4.—A toy wagon near a sand pit led to the discovery that Willard Harris and Raymond Gettke had been buried alive. When a toy was found the sand slide was dug up and the bodies were recovered.

**TWINS BURNED TO DEATH**

Mother Who Poured Kerosene on the Kitchen Stove Will Die.


Utica, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Endeavoring to hurry the kitchen fire Mrs. Antonio Zysk poured kerosene in the stove. There was an explosion and she ran, a flaming torch, into the street.

The house was gutted and when the firemen entered the kitchen they found Mrs. Zysk's twin babies, four years old, burned to a crisp.

The mother received burns from which she probably will die.

**TAXING OF FOREIGN CONCERNS IS LEGAL**

**Federal Supreme Court Upholds Massachusetts Law.**

Washington, Nov. 4.—After years of vain endeavor of state authorities to tax foreign corporations doing business within their borders Massachusetts has solved the problem. The supreme court sustained as constitutional the Massachusetts foreign corporation tax law of 1909, Chief Justice Pitney and Justices Van Devanter and Pitney dissenting.

The decision was regarded by many who heard Justice Day deliver it as marking an epoch in state taxation. The Massachusetts law provides that every foreign corporation shall pay annually an excise tax of one-fiftieth of 1 per cent of its authorized stock.

Justices Day, Holmes, McKenna, Lurton, Hughes and Lamar interpreted this to mean almost the same as the federal corporation tax law, which avoided previous errors by careful phraseology. They held that this meant a tax on the privilege of doing business within the state and not a tax on the corporation outside the state.

**BRITISH MARINES LANDED**

Serious Rioting in Connection With New Zealand Strike.

Auckland, N. Z., Nov. 2.—The British admiralty landed marines here and at Wellington because of the desperate conflict between the employers of New Zealand and the Federation of Labor. The working men, confronted with starvation as a result of the struggle, which has stopped all organized industry, began rioting.

**Ordinance No. 184.**

An ordinance repealing section 4 of ordinance No. 164, and enacting a substitute therefor, establishing a price at which the city water shall be sold.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cresco, Iowa:  
 Sec. 1. That section 4 of ordinance No. 164 be and the same hereby is repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

Section 4 of Ordinance No. 164. Meter rates:  
 The first 10,000 gallons, 40 cents per 1000 gallons.  
 All over 10,000 gallons to 20,000 gallons, 35 cents per 1000 gallons.  
 All over 20,000 gallons to 30,000 gallons, 30 cents per 1000 gallons.  
 All over 30,000 gallons to 40,000 gallons, 25 cents per 1000 gallons.  
 All over 40,000 gallons to 50,000 gallons, 20 cents per 1000 gallons.  
 All over 50,000 gallons, 15 cents per 1000 gallons.  
 The minimum water rate shall be \$1.50 per quarter year.

Section 2. That no water shall be sold at flat rates after January 1, 1914.  
 Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after its publication in the Cresco Plain Dealer and Howard County Times.  
 Passed November 3, 1913.
