OBITUARY

At her Pilot Grove home in Winneshek County, Iowa, Saturday morning, Nov. 1, 1913, occurred the death of Mrs. Olivia S. Teetshorn at the age of 84 years, 5 months and 2 days.

The funeral was at the home on the following Tuesday, and interment in Oak Lawn Cemetery, Cresco, Iowa, by the side of the husband who preceded her in death by over thirty years. The funeral discourse by Rev. Sylvester of the Ridgeway Methodist church was able and impressive. His word pictures illustrative of the beauties in life in the different stages from infancy to old age, and his portrayal of what constitutes beautiful old age were words to be remembered. Some beautiful vocal selections were admirably rendered by the Ridgeway quartet choir.

Olivia S. Pardee, daughter of Ebenezer and Samantha Pardee, was born in Hcmer, Courtland county, N. Y., May 29, 1829. She was the youngest and the last to survive of a family of six sisters, and no one to perpetuate the Pardee name. She was a direct descendant of the New England Puritans, her parents being natives of Connecticut. She was reared under strict, church-going, religious influences.

She moved with her people to Walworth county, Wis., in 1845, and was married to Chauncey H. Teetshorn in 1850. Four children were born to the family, three sons and one daughter. John A., born in 1853, died at the age of six years, and was buried at Utters Corners, Wis. C. E., born in 1856, and living near Cresco in the pioneer Iowa home. Flora B., now Mrs. Flora Beucher, born in 1859, and also residing with her only child, Myrtle, at the old home. George F., born in 1875, died in infancy and was buried in Oak Lawn, Cresco.

The family came from Wisconsin to Winneshek County, Iowa, in 1866, and turned the virgin sod. The husband and father died in 1883. The mother has lived continuously in the old home to the time of death.

Grandma Teetshorn left to her natural heirs a comparatively moderate amount of property, real or personal. But she had enough. She had been careful not to become a dependent and a beggar in the world. But our mother left us more than all the wealth of all the world. She left us a long life as a builder, a peacemaker, and a harmonizer in the home. Moral suasion was her rod of chastisement, and she was skillful in its use. She always carried in her hand a mantle of charity, and when any discord or misunderstanding crept in she would cover the wounds and say: "You should know each other better."

While she recognized such a thing as intentional wrong-doing, she held, mainly, to the following beautiful lines:

"If I knew you and you knew me,
If both of us could plainly see,
And with an inner sight divine
The meaning of your heart and mine;
I'm sure that we would differ less
And clasp our hands in friendship,
Our thoughts would pleasantly agree,
If I knew you and you knew me."

Mother left us as an inheritance, over thirty years of widowhood as a beacon-light to our little mariners on the tempestuous sea of life—an exemplar—a moral teacher, and a guardian angel in the home. Over three decades ago our mother planted a tree in our midst. She cultivated that tree and it grew and expanded and blossomed successively for six grand-children and four great-grand-children. And that tree is the tree of maternal love. I may say that the world is dotted over with trees of maternal love.

A father's love may be more compared to a stern, judge-like method of dispensing justice to his children. What is maternal love? Show me the scales strong enough to weigh a mother's love. A father and mother had become estranged from their son, and in my presence the father declared that his son could come home no more. The mother with the look of Heaven in her eyes spoke up: "Our son has gone wrong, but he must be allowed to return." A mysterious connecting link between mother and son, I recognized. Her son was a part of her very life. We are told how, on one occasion, Benjamin Franklin thought to test this connecting link between mother and child by concealing his identity from her; but a something told her that he was her son. Her son was still a part of her very life. King Solomon won his first great renown by his method of determining the real mother of a babe in controversy (I. Kings III). Two women came before Solomon both claiming the one babe. Solomon called for his sword to cut the babe in two and give each woman half. The real mother cried out: "Oh, my lord, give her the living child and in no wise slay it." And the woman whose babe it was not, said: "Let it be neither mine or thine, but divide it." The child was a part of the mother's very life.

I have been fortunate in that I have had the blessed privilege of drinking constantly and deeply at the fountain of my mother's love for over fifty-seven years. And now, boys and girls, young men and young women, middle-aged men and middle-aged women, ponder over these thoughts and you will better appreciate your mother's love for you.

"Ere I am old, oh! let me give
My life to learning how to live;
Then shall I meet, with willing heart,
An early summons to depart,
Or find my lengthened days consoled
By God's sweet peace—when I am old."
