## LILLIAN RUSSELL.

Actress Will Refuse to Pay  
Income Tax to Uncle Sam.



### BECAUSE DENIED THE BALLOT

Lillian Russell Will Refuse to Pay  
Tax on Income of \$100,000.

Kansas City, Nov. 11.—As a protest against the denial of the ballot to women, and as a means of arousing American women to the pitch of near-militant methods, Lillian Russell, the actress, says she will refuse to pay her income tax to the federal govern ment.

Miss Russell made this announce ment at a dinner at the home of her cousin, H. H. Watts, given in honor of the birthday of the actress' husband. Her income is said to exceed \$100,000 a year.

### TRAINMEN SECURE INCREASE IN WAGES.

### Arbitration Decision Affects One Hundred Thousand Men.

New York, Nov. 11.—The prolonged controversy between railroads of the East and their conductors and train-

men over the latter's demands for more pay has ended.

The employees are granted an in crease in wages averaging 7 per cent and totaling \$6,000,000 annually—about half of what they wanted—from Oct. 1 last, effective for one year. One hundred thousand men will share in the increase.

This ends by arbitration under the Newlands amendment to the Erdman act a controversy that threatened to tie up by strike the transportation facilities of all states east of the Mississippi river and north of the Ohio. The award of the arbitration committee is binding and final.

In reaching its award the board ruled mainly against the employes on four out of five points submitted as reasons why the increase should be granted and found for them on the fifth—the increased cost of living.

Since 1909, when the last wage in crease was granted, the arbitrators found the cost of living has increased 7 per cent.

### GREAT CROWDS ON STREETS

Russian Acquitted of Murder Remains  
in Jail.

Kiev, Russia, Nov. 11.—Mendel Bel-liss, exonerated by a jury of the mur der of Andrew Yushinsky, remained in his cell under heavy guard, while soldiers patrolled the streets, roamed by great crowds.

Anti-semitic agitators, many of whom are students, are openly inciting mobs to pogroms by affirming that the Jews purchased the verdict.

The governor of Kiev, however, called a meeting of representatives of the Jews and promised everything would be done to prevent outbreaks.

### 280-YEAR SENTENCE NOLLED

Alaska Banker's Term Is Set Aside by  
Court.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The 280-year prison sentence imposed upon C. M. Summers, president of the First Na tional bank of Juneau, Alaska, for mis application of funds, was set aside by the supreme court.

The indictment charged fifty-six of fenses and the trial court sentenced him to five years on each. The su preme court held that but one count should have been included in the in dictment.

### TOTAL DEATH LIST PROBABLY EIGHT

### More Bodies Found in Ruins at Cedar Rapids, Ia.

Cedar Rapids, Ia., Nov. 16.—After digging all night in the ruins of the new building of Lyman Bros., mill nery jobbers part of which collapsed, the bodies of William Schneider, fore man, of La Crosse, Wis., and Luther Moore, colored, of Cedar Rapids were recovered.

Those known to be still under the ruins are William Lowe, superintendent, of Waterloo; Sid Doty, hoisting engineer, of Cedar Rapids; H. B. Westcott and E. Toran, both cement work ers, of Cedar Rapids.

George Burrell, who was one of the victims rescued, died at Mercy hos pital. The total death list is believed to be eight. The building was being erected by Lauritzen & Wasson of Waterloo.

## SIX DEMOCRATS COMPLETE BILL

Senators Have Currency Meas ure Ready to Report.

### PRESIDENT APPROVES PLAN

Proposition Calls for System of Eight  
Regional Banks Under Control  
of Federal Reserve Board.

Washington, Nov. 15.—The admin istration currency reform bill, as it probably will go to the senate with the approval of President Wilson, has been completed by six Democrats of the senate banking and currency com mittee.

Senator Hitchcock and the five Re publican members of the committee continued to write into their draft of the measure amendments of which the White House has disapproved.

As completed the Democratic meas ure provides for a system of eight regional banks, to be capitalized by enforced subscriptions from the na tional banks of the country, with un limited powers of rediscount and cur rency issue and the power to hold reserves, the entire system to be un der the control of a federal reserve board.

The Democrats cut down the federal reserve board from nine, as fixed by a former vote of the committee, to seven, as originally fixed in the house bill.

### Six to Be Appointed.

The secretary of the treasury and six members to be appointed by the president would compose the board.

Each member would hold office for six years at a salary of \$10,000 a year.

The Democrats eliminated from the redemption section of the bill the provision that the new currency should be redeemable in "lawful money" as well as gold.

The Republicans rewrote the re discount section to provide that any member bank with eligible paper might obtain, as a matter of right, re discounts up to an amount equal to its capitalization.

The Republicans said they would be unable to present their final draft of the bill before the end of next week and that they would hardly be ready

Houston, Tex., Nov. 18.—Twelve hours after the settlement of the strike of the operating employes practically normal passenger service had been re stored on the Sunset lines of the Southern Pacific railroad and for the first time since the strike started freight trains were moved.

### MACKAY-BLAKE SUIT ENDED

Announcement Denies Any Pay for  
Dropping of Charges.

New York, Nov. 11.—Announcement was made by Arthur C. Train, counsel for Mrs. Clarence H. Mackay, that the action commenced in the supreme court by Mrs. Joseph A. Blake against Mrs. Mackay for \$1,000,000 for alleged alienation of the affections of her hus band, has been discontinued.

He asserted Mrs. Blake received no money in settlement.
