SIMPLE WEDDING AT WHITE HOUSE

Miss Jessie Wilson Becomes Mrs. Francis B. Sayre.

CEREMONY IN EAST ROOM

Distinguished Company Attends First Notable Social Event of President Administration.

Washington, Nov. 25.—In the lofty East room of the White House, under a flood of mellow electric light from thousands of incandescents shining through cut crystal and in the presence of a distinguished company of more than 500, Miss Jessie Woodrow Wilson, second daughter of the president of the United States, was married to Francis B. Sayre of New York. The officiating clergyman was Rev. Sylvester W. Beach of Princeton, a friend of the Wilson family. Miss Margaret Wilson, sister of the bride, was maid of honor, and Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell of Labrador, a close personal friend of the bridegroom, acted as best man. The bridesmaids were Miss Eleanor R. Wilson, sister of the bride; Miss Mary G. White of Baltimore, Miss Adeline Mitchell Scott of Princeton and Miss Marjorie Brown of Atlanta, Ga. Benjamin B. Burton of New York city, Dr. Scovill Clark of Salem, Mass.; Dr. Gilbert Horax of Montclair, N. J.; Charles E. Hughes, Jr., of Washington and New York city were the ushers.

The wedding marked the first social function of genuine importance of the Washington winter season. Likewise it was the first notable social event of the Wilson administration which came into being nearly nine months ago. The ceremony was a simple one in keeping with the tastes of the bride and her parents. Although the event was without military display members of the diplomatic corps and officers of the army and navy appeared in uniforms.

Bridal Gown of White Satin.
Miss Jessie Wilson had always been considered the beauty of the family. She was attired in a gown of white satin. It was the soft yet heavy sort that seemed to cling rather than to insist upon the retentions of rectangles of its drapings. It was trimmed with real lace, the folds being held in place by natural orange blossoms. The bodice of the gown was embroidered in an orange blossom design.

Few young women about to enter the married state have had so many gifts showered upon them. Miss Wilson has received remembrances from every corner of the globe. The great spare room on the top floor of the White House has been filled to overflowing with gifts. The most prized among them is the gift of the house of representatives, a pendant, pear-shaped in outline, containing eighty-five small pure white diamonds and one large diamond of beautiful tint. The musical program by the United States Marine band included selections from the work of the late Ethelbert Nevin, a cousin of the bridegroom. The boy choir of St. John's Episcopal church furnished the vocal music.

While Miss Wilson was the thirteenth bride going forth from the White House, her marriage was only the fifth in which the bride was a president's daughter.

GOMPERS REMAINS AT HEAD

Federation of Labor Convention Elects and Adjourns.
Seattle, Wash., Nov. 24.—The American Federation of Labor adjourned after re-electing Samuel Gompers president and choosing Philadelphia as the place of its next convention, which will assemble on the second Monday of November, 1914.

In the list of vice presidents are only two new men, John P. White and Frank Duffy. Second Vice President John Mitchell and Fifth Vice President William D. Huber retired voluntarily.

DIES OF HEART DISEASE

E. M. Holland, Actor Since 1867, Expires at Cleveland.
Cleveland, O., Nov. 25.—E. M. Holland, sixty-five years old, one of the best known actors on the American stage, died here of heart disease. He was stricken in his room in a hotel and was found lying unconscious on the floor. Holland starred in many productions and created leading roles in many others. He had been a figure on the American stage since 1867.

SELECTED FOR COMMISSION

Wilson Names Three for American Members in Philippines.
Washington, Nov. 25.—President Wilson nominated the three following named for American members of the Philippine commission: Secretary of public instruction and vice governor of the Philippine Islands, Henderson S. Martin of Kansas. Secretary of commerce and police, Clinton L. Riggs of Baltimore, Md. Secretary of the Interior, Winfred T. Denison of New York.

AN OPERA HOUSE

At the meeting held in the Court House Nov. 17th to meet with Mr. Cox, an architect from Estherville, Iowa, who makes a specialty of theatre building, much interest was manifested and much information was gathered relative to the kind of a public building that is badly needed in Cresco.

While it is impossible to tell just what the building will be like when finished it was agreed that Cresco needs a building with a high basement about 50x100 feet that could be used for an assembly hall.

The theatre above this is to be in every way modern, of a size best suited for Cresco and finished throughout so as to be attractive yet one that will pay a good dividend on the investment of \$20,000 that it has been estimated this building will cost when completed.

From Mr. Cox we learned that large and showy theatres were not paying investments in towns of this size, but small ones properly managed paid exceptionally well.

No one can say what dividends this investment will pay here but it is a sure thing if every one in Cresco who can afford it becomes interested it ought to be a good paying investment.
