Commerce Commissioner is Victim of Acute Indigestion.



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JOHN H. MARBLE IS DEAD

Commerce Commissioner Victim of Acute Indigestion.

Washington, Nov. 22.—John Hobart Marble, member of the interstate commerce commission, died at his home here of acute indigestion, following an illness of two days in Philadelphia.

Mr. Marble's death came unexpectedly. Mrs. Marble and their eighteen-year-old daughter were not in the room, the family physician having just been called in.

Mr. Marble had been connected with the interstate commerce commission for a number of years and was thoroughly trained in its intricate workings. Mr. Marble was forty-six years of age.

OPENS DEBATE ON CURRENCY MEASURE

Senator Owen Says Bill Will Prove Beneficial.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Under the present system the bank reserves of the country are concentrated largely in New York, where they are loaned in speculative accounts on the New York stock exchange. Senator Owen asserted in opening the debate on the currency bill in the senate. He said the administration bill as reported by the Democrats of the banking committee would remedy this condition.

Senator Owen said that by the creation of a market for discounted commercial paper and by mobilizing the reserves in public utility regional banks the measure would remove the great dangers of the present financial system.

The senator declared that the New York bankers who hold a large percentage of the country's reserves are forced to place these reserves in call loans on the stock exchange.
