## IOWA NEWS BRIEFS

Algona will pave 52 city block in that city next year.

Scarlet fever is raging at Coin and the schools have been closed.

John Johnson, druggist of Estherville, is dead of spinal meningitis.

The school at Coin is closed on account of an epidemic of diphtheria.

A. B. Somers, of Tama, a well known horse man, dropped dead at Toledo.

Malvin Bench, of Elliott, ran into a calf with his motorcycle and broke his collar bone.

The annual convention of the Clayton County Sunday School association was held at McGregor.

R. H. Meade, of Waterloo, aged 38 years, committed suicide by drinking two ounces of carbolic acid.

On account of poor patronage the opera house at Audubon will be closed for the remainder of the season.

Henry Bristler, 40 years old, dropped dead in the home of his mother Mrs. Barbara Karras, at Massena.

Frank Edwards, a Fort Dodge resident, committed suicide recently by shooting himself in the head with a revolver.

Three hundred business men of Oskaloosa have been sworn in as deputy sheriffs in order to preserve order in that city.

A. F. Kearney, of Maquoketa, has been appointed a special agent in the department of justice. His salary ranges from \$2,000 to \$3,000 a year.

"Tama" Jim Wilson will devote the next few months to writing a personal history of his experiences while a member of the presidential cabinet.

Frank A. Charles, a leading attorney of Coon Rapids, was declared insane after an examination, and was ordered sent to the asylum at Clarinda.

Guy C. Black, of Orient, aged 20 years, committed suicide at his home by taking strychnine. He was regarded as wonderfully strong in mind and body.

Superintendents of the schools at Iowa Falls and Ackley, and their corps of teachers, visited the public schools and the training school at Teachers' college.

J. P. Anderson, a 1912 graduate at Ames, has accepted an appointment as the government's horticulture experimentalist in Alaska at the Sitka experiment station.

Divorce proceedings were instituted at Dubuque recently by Mrs. Nathan Myers McShane, wife of E. L. McShane, of Omaha. Both are from prominent families.

Carl Larson, who was found guilty of breaking and entering the S. M. Dean store at Ft. Dodge was given a ten-year indeterminate sentence at Anamosa by Judge Albrook.

Mrs. John T. Hoyer, a pioneer of Ackley, died at the home of her son, William Hoyer. She was 90 years old and had been a resident for forty-five years. She is survived by four children.

Chris Emerson, a well to do farmer near Mason City, committed suicide by shooting himself. He arose early and securing a rifle returned to bed. He pulled the trigger when his alarm clock registered 6 o'clock.

The 3-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. I. E. Tramp of Harlan, who won first prize at the baby health contest at the state fair one year ago, is dangerously ill from infantile paralysis. The left side has been paralyzed for several days.

Clarinda voted to retain the present form of government. The vote was 108 for the commission plan of government and 489 against. Mayor Peters, four councilmen and Business Manager Wilson were against making the change.

The dam at Keokuk continues to be a textbook for engineering students. Prof. A. Lincoln Hyde of the engineering school of the University of Missouri, accompanied seventeen engineering students here to inspect the big power dam.

Conductor S. S. Howard, of Savanna, Ill., was instantly killed at Sabula by a C. M. & St. P. train. His widow, four brothers, and two sisters survive. One of the former is Dr. Banner Howard, recently of Iowa City, now a resident of Cedar Rapids.

Roy Koyak, a south of Maquoketa farmer, met with a painful accident while finishing up his corn husking. In hurriedly stooping over he ran part of a broken corn stalk into one of his eyes, but miraculously missed losing the sight of the member.

The water mains at Estherville have been flushed and the new supply of drinking water for the city has just been turned in. Four wells were sunk close together, averaging in depth twenty-three feet and supplying, it is estimated, about 8,000 gallons per minute.

A pioneer Sunday school teacher whose death occurred recently, has been honored by a bronze tablet commemorative of her forty years of service, which was placed in the primary room of the First Baptist church at Keokuk. The teacher was Mrs. Sarah J. Rickards.

The large barn of S. W. Clark of Palo Alto county was burned to the ground. It contained 1,500 bushels of grain, 60 tons of hay, harness and farm machinery. The total loss is \$3,000. Mr. Clark led forty-one head of horses and cattle out of the burning building.

Supervisor James McTaggart of Butler county narrowly escaped death at Ackley when his auto turned turtle, pinning him beneath it. Mr. McTaggart was returning to Allison after superintending a job of road construction, when his auto skidded and turned over.

Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Abel of Meservey were badly hurt and their carriage was smashed when they collided with A. Koenen, a neighbor, who, with an auto, met them near a turn in the road. Both were thrown from their conveyance and seriously bruised. Mr. Koenen was not hurt.

The firm of Harger & Blish at Dubuque celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the institution. B. M. Harger, senior member of the firm, opened a small music store in Dubuque in November, 1863. A large branch of the concern now is operated in Des Moines.

The public school of Holy Cross, twenty miles northwest of Dubuque, was dismissed following an epidemic of measles. Thirty-seven of the fifty children attending school were attacked by the disease. It will probably be a week or ten days before classes will again begin.

E. B. Weeks, a prominent farmer of Johnson county, was badly hurt when his hand was caught by a circular wood saw. Two fingers, part of the palm, and a thumb, were mangled, and were necessarily amputated when the man was brought to the hospital at Iowa City. He is a brother of Hon. E. W. Weeks, of Guthrie Center.

Henry Coombs of Cedar Falls was arrested, charged with striking Andy Knudson, a fellow workman. The assault, it is alleged, occurred following an altercation at the new garage on First street. Knudson sustained a broken shoulder blade and two fractured ribs. Coombs has been held in bail for a hearing before Mayor Mermer.

The Iowa Gate company of Cedar Falls has completed plans for a new factory building to cover 20,000 square feet of ground. It will be the largest structure in this part of the country. With this addition the company will double its output. It now sells to every state in the union and many foreign countries.

Conrad M. Butts, who has lived on the same farm near Farmersburg for sixty-three years, was buried. Mr. Butts came to Clayton county in 1850. He was 85 years old at the time of death. In 1864 he enlisted in Company B, Fourth Iowa infantry, and was in Sherman's army when it marched to the sea.

Tiring of supporting her husband after thirty-two years of married life, Elphretta Robinson secured a divorce from Joshua Robinson at Des Moines. The woman declared on the witness stand that during the greater part of her life she had supported her children by taking in washing.

The fire drill in Britt proved a valuable asset to the schools when every one of the children in the public school were moved from the building without injury of one. Fire was discovered in the basement and had made good headway when discovered. The students are enjoying a vacation while the building is being repaired.

A representative of Swift & Co., cleared up the fat cattle in the neighborhood of Hamburg recently, purchasing 2,600 head to be shipped direct to Boston. The price paid was \$8.75. W. P. Carpenter sold 1,800 head, Raymond Carpenter 300, Bert Morgan 175, John Finnell, Jr., 130, Alex Crabtree 130, and Chris Brown 85.

Rev. V. W. Bondo, for the last six years pastor of the Danish Lutheran church at Davenport, has accepted a call to the Gethsemane church in Racine, Wis., and at a meeting of the congregation of the Davenport church a call was extended to Fred Hansen, who early next spring will complete his course at the Danish Lutheran Theological seminary at Blair, Neb.

While walking the Northwestern railroad track between Gilbert Station and Story City, B. J. Svedy, a farmer near Randall, was struck by the pilot of the engine of train No. 63, receiving a broken right arm and numerous cuts and bruises. He was put aboard the train and brought back to Ames, where he was taken to the office of Dr. Budge who set the fracture and attended to his other bruises.

Six pupils in two of the largest schools of Council Bluffs, Bloomer and Washington avenue, where 1,400 children attend, have been discovered to be suffering from some rare form of skin disease. They were all ordered home, their books were destroyed and strong efforts made to prevent a spread of the disease. Physicians declared the disease to be highly infective.

Petitions are being circulated for a special election to vote on issuing bonds for the improvement of the water works system at Valley Junction. The proposed amount is \$39,000, and some opposition is developing.

The last of the concrete work on this year's paving contract was finished at Eagle Grove and the asphalt crews are working overtime. About one and one-half miles of paving have been put in this year.

An entire little family wiped out within ten months—that is the fate of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Fitzpatrick and their babe. The wife and mother died at Las Cruces, N. M., and her body was brought for interment in the family burying ground near Cedar Valley; the husband and father died June 22 of the current year; and the child died on February 14, 1913. The young mother was but 26. She was a former Iowa teacher, and was a Drake student once.

An elder of the Latter Day Saints church in Lamoni has presented his church with an automobile to be used by the officers of the church in making missionary trips to small preaching stations in the country near by.

Miss Alvina Robinson, a Simpson graduate who has been engaged in missionary work in Burma, is visiting friends in Keosauqua. Miss Robinson returned in August and has been with her parents in the state of Washington.
