NOTICE OF AMENDMENT TO AMENDED AND SUBSTITUTED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HUNTING ELEVATOR COMPANY, A CORPORATION HERETOFORE OF MCGREGOR, CLAYTON COUNTY, IOWA.

IOWA NEWS BRIEFS

A wholesale poisoner of dogs is believed to be at work at Clinton. A third bar probably will be opened at Valley Junction if the present dry conditions continue in Des Moines. Patrick Curran for ten-years agent for the Milwaukee railroad at Portsmouth shot and killed himself because of ill health.

The Burlington depot at Hastings was robbed of \$20.90 by a masked man who pointed a gun at R. C. Cook, the night agent.

Atlantic is putting up a strong battle as the site for the epileptic colony. The place is to be decided upon by the state board of control.

The John Merritt farm, about one-half mile south of Dunlap, was sold to Pete Barrett for \$185 per acre. This is a fine farm of 187 acres.

John Keller, a civil war veteran living north of Cedar Rapids, died of paralysis caused by his coming in contact with a circular saw blade.

Over 100 delegates are expected at the missionary meeting at Marshalltown. This is a part of a nation-wide movement by ministers and laymen.

Persons of prominence in historical matters at Knoxville are endeavoring to locate the graves of all veterans of the war of 1812, buried in Marion county.

Lorenza D. Evans, formerly of Winterset, and Joseph W. Latta, of Winona, Minn., civil war veterans, are dead at the Soldiers' home at Marshalltown.

The "Padrone System" is alleged to be in practice in Mason City by both railroad and roundhouse foremen. The foremen are accused of extorting from the men.

The county jail at Grinnell is in such a bad state of repair that the board of supervisors were advised it would cost too much money to make it fit for use.

United States customs collectors at Des Moines joined with the police in a campaign against opium. Two joints were raided and a half dozen arrests were made.

Alice Murphy, the 12 year old daughter of Mrs. T. J. Murphy of New Hampton, died as the result of burns received from starting a furnace fire with kerosene.

Dan Knapp, age 35, a Northwestern railroad conductor of Clinton, was killed at Ellsworth, Ill. He was well known and exceedingly popular among his friends.

Burglars Sunday night entered the Kirkwood & Richards clothing store at Des Moines and got away with \$800 worth of clothing. The loot made half a wagon load.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Swartz of Thurman, is again quarantined for scarlet fever, their little son, Bern, having it for the second time within a few weeks.

Twelve thousand signers have been obtained to a saloon consent petition in Des Moines preparatory to its being submitted to the Polk county board of supervisors.

Miss Emma Ricord, indicted for perjury in connection with the attorney, F. B. Kimball, disbarment proceedings has gone on "hunger strike" in the county jail at Iowa City.

C. H. Smith, postmaster at Rock Rapids since 1905, has forwarded his resignation to Washington and asks to be relieved before Christmas. He will leave for Crockett, Calif., December 25.

Mayor Louis Roth, of Cedar Rapids, addressing a convention of moving picture men of Iowa, declared the producing of indecent plays should be made a grave offense punishable by a fine.

Leonard Sorenson, age 16, of Ossian, was accidentally killed by the discharge of a gun which he and a companion were handling. The boys were at Oelwein when the accident occurred.

The common law freed Judy Mosely of Centerville, who shot Schrumm, a coal operator. Schrumm who died of his wounds was found in the company of Mosely's wife after being warned to stay away.

According to advance information furnished by the Polk company, publishers of the local directory, Sioux City has a population of 60,284, an increase of 12,406 since the census was taken in 1910.

August Kluss, proprietor of a hotel at Postville, took his life by shooting himself. He went to a nearby barn and with a revolver shot himself through the head. He leaves a wife and grown family.

A tri-city district fair to be located between Waterloo and Cedar Falls is being planned by a number of citizens of Waterloo. It is proposed to supply stock at \$10 per share for grounds and necessary buildings.

Louise, the 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Albright of Birmingham, Iowa, was fatally burned when her clothing caught fire while playing with some matches and a candle in a neighbor's yard.

M. J. Wragg, of Des Moines, president of the Southwestern Iowa Horticultural society, in his address at the opening of the 39th annual session of the organization in Council Bluffs, made an attack on modern billboards.

Superintendent Clark of the Sioux City schools has been instructed to draft a public school rule prohibiting all use of tobacco in any form and to provide for its enforcement. The rule is demanded by the action of the last legislature.

Announcement of the proposed expenditure of \$150,000 for the enlargement of its Sioux City shops was made by the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railway company. The proposed work will mean greatly increased payroll for Sioux City.

Sarvary Clarida, leader of the "sunshine cult" and self confessed burglar of a church, has been held to the grand jury at Davenport and his bonds fixed at \$1,000. Clarida admitted he stole vestments and vessels from the Sacred Heart cathedral in that city.

Carl Wurtzel of Waterloo died as the result of an unusual accident. He was shingling a building on the Dundee farm in Jefferson township. When he cut a shingle the knife penetrated his leg above the knee, severing an artery. His death followed from loss of blood.

The directors of the Keokuk baseball club are considering Joe Bills, outfielder of the Wichita nine, for the position of manager of the local club. George Manush, leader of last year's team, and Jack Herbert of the Cedar Rapids club, are also reported to be listed for consideration.

The annual sale of delinquent property of Boone county was held at the office of County Treasurer Theodore Duckworth. The office was filled with bidders and at times the bidding was sharp and lively. There were just 121 sales, amounting to \$1,319.18, the smallest tax sale on record, it is stated.

The town of Farley will pay tribute to the memory of her former townsman, Dr. William McGee, a noted geologist, who served on the waterways commission under President Roosevelt. Dr. McGee bequeathed his body for dissection and the study of cancer and brain cells to specialists in Philadelphia.

The forty-seventh anniversary of the grange movement will be held at Buckeye church in Oskaaloosa. In addition to Buckeye, Grange, East Center, Fairview and Adams Granges will participate. There will be an address on the origin of the grange, recitations, readings and music. It is an open session and the public is invited.

For the past five weeks the state has had an expert at Mason City examining into the qualities, quantities, and economical handling of the clay product of this locality. He expects to remain here until the first part of the year, and will then furnish the state with an exhaustive report of his findings.

At the monthly business session of the Muscatine County Crop Improvement association J. A. McLean of Wilton township was chosen as president of the society to succeed F. D. Steen of West Liberty, who recently removed to Ames, where his children are attending the state agricultural college.

John Jester, aged 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gottlieb Jester, residing in Washington township, died from injuries received. While he and a comrade were racing horses the animal Jester was riding bolted and threw him against a fence post. His spine was injured and he suffered other hurts. He never recovered full consciousness.

Anticipating a third ticket will be placed in the field at the municipal election at Dubuque in the spring, twenty-nine prominent citizens, twenty of whom are republicans, filed notice with the county auditor they would be identified with the progressive party hereafter. "The progressive party is alive," was the explanation of one.

The Hart-Parr Tractor company, of Charles City, the largest in the world, will close down on December 20 and remain closed until January 5, the purpose being to take an inventory of stock. For the past year there has been a big slump in the tractor markets of the world. Commencing today the payroll is to be materially reduced.

Announcement has been made that A. P. Canny, of Ottumwa, has been appointed deputy revenue collector of the Third district of Iowa to succeed John O'Neal, of this city. Mr. Canny is a democratic leader in Ottumwa and was recommended to the president by Representative Kirkpatrick. Mr. O'Neal has held the position for 21 years. His displacement by Mr. Canny is assumed to be based merely on politics.

Work on the Northwestern railway's new shops at Clinton is being finished very rapidly and everything will be in operation soon. The new machinery is nearly all there. The monster wheel lathe is all set up and ready to run as soon as the power is turned on. This is the largest wheel lathe in this section of the country, and it is said that it is even more up-to-date than the one in the Chicago shops.

The thirteenth annual exposition of the Muscatine poultry fanciers opened auspiciously. The large number of entries insure the success of the show which has as its scene the Commercial hotel property. Several hundred birds have arrived and more are expected. W. S. Russell of Ottumwa, who has been secured as the judge, will take up the scoring at once and within several days the most important awards will be announced.

A surprise was sprung on counsel for D. H. Hedrick, legatee under the will of the late Mrs. Alex Hugh of Ida Grove, when Nagelstad and Walters entered the appearance of B. I. Salinger of Carroll, as associate counsel with them in the interests of their client, S. I. Hoover. Judge Powers is on the bench and it had been agreed upon both sides that the case would be continued until the January term of court.

A planned jail delivery was frustrated by Sheriff Fitzgerald of Mason City, who, in making his round of inspection, discovered a half dozen jail bars sawed off and the cuts filled with soap and dirt so well that only a careful observer would have detected the cut. During the past week or two three negro prisoners have been putting on song and dance entertainments during the afternoon, and it is thought these were blinds to drown the noise of the saw.

ADMIRAL DEWEY.

Says Our Navy Should Be Greatly Enlarged by 1920.

DECLARES OUR NAVY IS WEAK

Admiral Dewey Would Build Four Dreadnoughts Yearly.

Washington, Dec. 2.—Admiral Dewey's views of the naval program the United States should adopt if it is to guard its international policies in the family of nations are transmitted to President Wilson with the report of Secretary Daniels.

The admiral's views, which embody the recommendations of the navy general board, are that the fleet should consist of forty-eight battleships of the line before 1920, if possible, and that the building program should begin this year with four dreadnoughts, sixteen destroyers, eight submarines and minor craft.

ANOTHER PRECEDENT BROKEN

No Reception at White House on New Year's Day.

Washington, Nov. 22.—President Wilson has shattered a precedent of more than 100 years' standing. He announced that there would be no public reception at the White House on New Year's day.

For many years it has been customary for the president to stand in the blue room from two to five hours and shake hands with all who come along. This will not be done this year.

Instead, the president will go away from Washington for a "brief holiday vacation," and will not be in the White House on New Year's day.

IMPORTANT RATE HEARING BEGINS

Eastern Lines Fighting to Raise Freight Tariffs.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Railroads of the country have felt the burden of the increased cost of living, like all other enterprises or individuals, "but unlike all others have not been permitted so far to raise their prices or adjust their charges in recognition of that burden," Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, said in arguing before the interstate commerce commission for authority to increase freight rates approximately 5 per cent in the territory east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers.

In presenting the facts upon which the railroads rely to prove the necessity for an increase in rates, Mr. Willard asserted that during the last three years the railroads in the territory affected had spent in property investments \$600,000,000, or at the rate of \$200,000,000 per year. Nevertheless, he added, because of the fact that operating expenses had increased faster than operating revenues these railroads earned in the year ending June 30, 1913, less by \$16,311,321 than for the year ending June 30, 1910.
