MINERS CLASH WITH MILITIA

Battle in Colorado Results in Thirteen Deaths.

TROOPS USE MACHINE GUNS

Eleven Strikers, One Soldier and a Noncombatant Killed in Fourteen-Hour Engagement.

Trinidad, Colo., April 21.—Thirteen persons, including eleven strikers one soldier and one noncombatant, are dead and scores wounded as the result of a fourteen-hour battle between members of the Colorado national guard and striking coal miners in the hills surrounding Ludlow. The battle culminated with the killing of Louis Tikes, leader of the Greek strikers, and the destruction of the Ludlow tent colony by fire.

Union men declared the fighting was the result of an attack on the Ludlow colony by troops. Reports from military authorities were that the first shots came from the hills above Cedar Hill and that the real fighting began when Lieutenant Linderfelt's detachment was sent to investigate. The soldiers were divided into two detachments, one commanded by Lieutenant Linderfelt and the other by Lieutenant Lawrence.

The Ludlow colony is in isolation. Tents are burning and dead and wounded are strewn about the hills. A machine gun brought by reinforcements was stationed near the Ludlow colony and in a short time the camp was devastated, strikers fleeing to the hills for safety.

The military force totaled about 100 men, while the strikers were said to number 400, mostly in the hills at the foot of Hastings and Berwind canons, and along the Colorado and South-eastern tracks. An effort to send recruits from Trinidad was delayed by the refusal of the train crew to take out the train. The master mechanic, superintendent and dispatcher finally took out the recruits.
