Look him over and come down to the race track and see him trot and then turn him down if you wish.

Ridgeway Farmer in Trouble.

H. E. Forrester, assistant state dairy and food commissioner, was here today. He caused the arrest of a farmer south of Ridgeway, whom he charged with selling rotten cream to the Lincoln Creamery Co., and his fine and costs in the case amounted to \$13 50. No one knows when he is liable to happen around, thus it is best to see that you take care of your cream. He is also after those who sell rotten eggs and he told us he was going to cause the arrest tomorrow of a party near who he found was selling rotten eggs. He also showed us an agreement he had with the merchants of Ridgeway whereby they agree to candle all eggs after June 1st. Merchants in other towns will have to do the same, as he says "If I know of a merchant or farmer selling rotten eggs I will cause his arrest."—Ridgeway Review.

Injured While Plowing.

Emil Borseth, living north of Ridgeway, met with a serious mishap last Thursday while plowing. He was standing in front of his horses while resting them. Suddenly they plunged forward, Mr. Borseth hanging on, but but was shortly thrown to the ground and the horses and the riding plow, to which they were hitched, passed over him. With the plow in the ground, the team circled the field until exhausted.

Mr. Borseth's brother-in-law was in the field at the time and went to his assistance. Dr. Lewis was called and found his breast badly mangled, requiring sixteen stitches to close the wounds. He has not injured internally, but what seems strange that he was not killed instantly.—Ridgeway Review.


