LAND PROBLEM VERY DIFFICULT TO SOLVE

Mediation Conference Nearly Becomes Deadlocked.

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 26.—The threatened deadlock in the mediation conference here over the vexed land question in Mexico is believed to have been averted by a compromise in which both the American and Mexican delegates made concessions.

The strong declaration of President Wilson on the subject published in an interview as the mediation conference was about to assemble aroused a good deal of feeling and for two or three days threatened a disastrous outcome of the whole effort at peace.

The Mexican delegates firmly declared that it is untrue that the feudal system of Mexico is the single or indeed the chief cause of the recurring revolutions. They said that personal ambition had played a much more important part.

Finally they held that the whole land question lies without the field of mediation and belonged to the legislative body of Mexico alone to deal with.

The Mexican delegates are preparing a statement expressive of their views upon the land question.

HOME RULE BILL BECOMES A LAW

Passes Commons by Majority of Seventy-seven.

PREMIER TELLS OF PLANS

Outlines Program He Intends to Carry Out in Hope of Reaching Compromise With Opponents.

London, May 26.—The Irish home rule bill passed its third reading in the house of commons by a majority of seventy-seven. The vote was: For, 351; against, 274.

The bill becomes law after this stage, as it already had twice passed through all its stages in the house of commons in two separate sessions and the veto of the house of lords therefore has no further effect.

The house was seething with excitement from the moment the speaker took the chair. Members of the various parties indulged in loud outbursts of cheering, when their respective champions entered the chamber, while at the same time mocking banter was shouted from the opposite benches.

Right Hon. James Lowther, the speaker, took an early opportunity of applying balm to the sores left by the violent incidents of Thursday last. He admitted he should not have used the expression he did when he asked Andrew Bonar-Law, leader of the opposition, whether he approved of the disorderly demonstration by the Unionist members.

Want News of Next Bill.

The speaker appealed to the premier to give the house some information regarding the bill to be introduced after the passage of the Irish home rule bill for the amendment of that measure so as to meet some of the objections of the people of Ulster.

Premier Asquith announced that the amended bill would give effect to any agreement which the government was still hopeful might be reached. He said that if at the time of the introduction of the Irish home rule bill to the house of lords no such agreement had been reached the amending bill would embody the substance of the proposals outlined by him on March 9 in the hope that after discussion an agreement might be secured.

On March 9 Premier Asquith told the house of commons that before the bill became operative a poll would be taken of the parliamentary electors of each county of Ulster to decide whether those counties should be excluded from the provisions of the Irish home rule bill for a period of six years from the first meeting of the new Irish parliament. If the majority of the voters were in favor of the scheme the county would automatically be excluded for the prescribed period.

MORGAN, JR., DENIES STORY TOLD ON STAND

Defends His Father Against Mellen's Accusations.

New York, May 26.—J. P. Morgan characterized as untrue the testimony of Charles S. Mellen, former head of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, before the interstate commerce commission in Washington last week, that J. Pierpont Morgan concealed from Mr. Mellen facts regarding the New Haven road which Mr. Mellen should have known.

Mr. Morgan offered to produce before any proper tribunal at any time the records of J. P. Morgan & Co. and the personal records of his father.

Taking full responsibility upon himself for the change in the road's presidency by which Mr. Mellen resigned and gave way to another Mr. Morgan said it was untrue that his father in any sense took from Mr. Mellen the management of the road or any part of its affairs.

Regarding the absorption of the Boston and Maine by the New Haven, Mr. Morgan said his father deemed it advisable for the public benefit, since it was recognized by others, as well as by the late Mr. Morgan himself, that changing economic conditions threatened the commercial position of New England.

REBELS LAND IN VERA CRUZ

New Force in State is Estimated at Three Thousand.

Washington, May 26.—The Constitutional force, reported by Huerta to the Spanish embassy as having landed in the state of Vera Cruz, is estimated at 3,000 in supplementary details received by Huerta from General Garcia Pena. The place of landing is believed to be Punta Barcas.

The Spanish ambassador informed the state department that the movement of the federal troops was against the Constitutionalists and not against the American garrison at Vera Cruz.

SALTILLO PARTLY BURNED

Federals Destroy Many Buildings Before Evacuating Town.

Saltillo, Mex., May 24.—Constitutionalist troops occupy every part of Saltillo. Federals destroyed the casino and cathedral and dynamited or burned many business blocks and public buildings before evacuating.

The capture was accomplished without real assistance. The main body of General Villa's army is being loaded on cars at Paredon and Hipolite. It is believed he proposes to capture Zacatecas before proceeding to San Luis Potosi. General Carranza will make Saltillo the provisional capital in a few days.

CARRIED CREW OF TWENTY-FIVE MEN

New Lightship Lost Off the Coast of Nova Scotia.

Halifax, May 24.—The loss of the new lightship Halifax No. 19, with all the twenty-five men on board, is indicated by the discovery of wreckage and three bodies near Liscomb, 100 miles east of here.

The lightship was on her way to this port from Paisley, Scotland, where she was built.

The lightship, which was due here Friday, is believed to have struck a rock while feeling her way through the thick fog that has enshrouded the coast for several days.

The wreckage was sighted and the bodies picked up by the steamer Dufferin, which reported that lifebeats marked "Halifax No. 19" were strapped about each of the victims.

All the victims are believed to be Scotchmen, who were engaged by the builders at Paisley to navigate the vessel across the Atlantic.

The lightship sailed a few days ago from St. Johns, N. F., where she had stopped for coal.

MISSING SINCE MARCH 31

Illinois "Dry" Worker Says He Knows His Abductors.

St. Louis, May 25.—Rev. Louis R. Patmont, the prohibition advocate who was kidnapped from Westville, Ill., on March 31 and found in an abandoned house near Columbia, Ill., declared here he knows the persons responsible for his detention. He is on his way to Danville, Ill., where the grand jury of Vermillion county, now in session, will turn aside immediately from all other matters to take up the investigation of his kidnapping.

He said a big red automobile owned in Danville was used in abducting him. He declared he was slugged and carried, half conscious, from one hiding place to another for fifty days. He said he knows the owner of the car.

Rev. Mr. Patmont disappeared after a dry meeting, in which he was one of the speakers, at Westville, Ill.

TWENTY-FIVE MEXICAN MINERS ARE KILLED.

Mexico City, May 26.—While a heavy piece of machinery was being lowered into a shaft at the Santa Gertrudis mines at Pachuca it fell, killing twenty-five miners below. All were Mexicans. Several mine bosses were arrested.

DR. EGAN IS SERIOUSLY ILL

American Minister to Denmark is Stricken.

Washington, May 26.—Dr. Maurice Francis Egan, American minister to Denmark, is seriously ill in this city. Dr. Egan came from Copenhagen recently for a vacation and to lecture through the South and West.

All of his engagements have been canceled on account of his condition.

JURY DECLARES BECKER GUILTY

Finds Former Police Officer Responsible for Murder.

PATHETIC SCENE IN COURT

Tears Stream Down the Foreman's Face as He Announces the Verdict.

New York, May 23.—Twelve men decided for the second time that Charles Becker was the archconspirator responsible for the Rosenthal murder, which nearly two years ago awoke New York to a realization of corruption in the police department and opened a new era of police reform.

Becker, once a police lieutenant, was found guilty of murder in the first degree.

Only a pardon or interference again by the court of appeals can save him from following to the electric chair the four gunmen who shot Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, early on the morning of July 16, 1912. The jury decided that the gunmen were Becker's agents.

One ballot decided Becker's fate. It was taken almost immediately after the jurors returned from luncheon at an uptown hotel, where they went as soon as Supreme Court Justice Samuel Seabury finished his charge. It was unanimous for conviction.

Tears streamed down the foreman's face as he announced the decision and tears stood in the eyes of several other jurors; but sympathy did not warp their judgment. They had agreed that the corroboration which the district attorney failed to present at the first trial to support the stories of Rose, Vallon and Webber, the three accomplices who turned informers, had been furnished by the new witnesses at the second.

Becker's counsel announced that he will appeal and gained a week's stay for the preparation of his future campaign. The defendant was granted a short meeting with his wife and his brothers and then taken back to his cell in the Tombs.

CONSUL SILLIMAN IS SAFE

News Removes Threatening Mediation Complication.

Washington, May 23.—One of the most threatening complications to mediation was removed when definite word reached the state department that Vice Consul John R. Silliman, arrested at Saltillo and long sought for, has arrived safely at Mexico City, accompanied by the British vice consul at Saltillo, Mr. MacMillan.

The news of Silliman's safety became known at the moment when Secretary Bryan was making public reports received from refugees that Silliman had been executed on May 18 by the federals at Saltillo. Great relief was expressed by cabinet members, several of them saying it removed one of the most dangerous features in the situation.

WON'T SEE JUDGE LINDSEY

Rockefeller, Jr., Refuses to Confer With Jurist on Colorado Strike.

New York, May 24.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., put an end to persistent rumors of a proposed conference with Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver relative to the Colorado strike situation by stating through his secretary that the interview never would take place. At Rockefeller's office it was said that a letter and a telegram had been received from Judge Lindsey asking for an interview.

DISSOLUTION PLAN IS UP

President and Attorney General Confer on New Haven.

Washington, May 26.—Plans for dissolution of the New Haven railroad system were taken up in a conference between President Wilson and Attorney General McReynolds.

After the conference it was announced that the president has asked Governor Walsh of Massachusetts to call on him Wednesday regarding the proposed legislation.

POST ESTATE IS \$20,000,000

Bulk of Manufacturer's Wealth Left to Widow and Daughter.

Washington, May 26.—The will of Charles W. Post of Battle Creek, Mich., who killed himself at Santa Barbara, Cal., on May 9, filed here for probate, leaves the bulk of an estate estimated at \$20,000,000 to the widow, Mrs. Lella Y. Post, and a daughter, Marjorie Post Close.

KOSSUTH'S SON PASSES AWAY

Offspring of Famous Hungarian Patriot Long Had Been Invalid.

Budapest, May 26.—Francis Kosuth, son of the great Hungarian patriot, died here, aged seventy-three years. He had been an invalid for many months and his death did not come as a surprise.


