Official Call for Democratic State Convention.

At a meeting of the Democratic State Central Committee, held in Des Moines, Iowa, on the 23rd day of March, 1914, a delegate convention was called to meet at Council Bluffs, Iowa, on the 23rd day of July, 1914, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of transacting such business as may legally come before said convention.

The ratio of representation will be one delegate from each county and one additional delegate for each 200 votes and fraction thereof over 100 votes cast for Hon. Woodrow Wilson for President at the general election of 1912. Upon such basis the counties in the 4th Congressional District of Iowa are entitled to the number of delegates as set forth below:

Those Happy Roosevelt Days.

The Johnstown, Pa., Democrat, replying to Col. Roosevelt's Pittsburgh speech recalls that then "more than 2,000 men march to the city hall at Detroit and demand work.—Jan. 28, 1908.

"Chicago Federation of Labor estimates the total number of unemployed men in Chicago at 100,000 and issues a warning to all craftsmen to keep away from the city.—Feb. 11, 1908.

"New York city government urged by Central Federated Labor Union to let subway contracts to furnish work for 500,000 unemployed men.—March 15, 1908.

"One hundred thousand men march through the streets of New York, singing the Marseillaise; speakers preach revolution and demand work; a bomb thrown at police by anarchists.—March 23, 1908.

"More than 200 Bulgarians petition governor of Colorado for employment or for aid to return to Bulgaria.—March 20, 1908.

"One thousand foreigners march toward Philadelphia city hall, demanding work; a riot, three policemen shot; fourteen marchers arrested; hundreds beaten by mounted police.—Feb. 20, 1908.

"Labor unions report 50,000 idle men in the Kensington, Pa. district.—Feb. 10, 1908.

"Unemployed in San Francisco form a league and demand the issue of \$25,000,000 in bonds to aid unemployed.—March 23, 1908.

"One thousand Hungarians march through the rain to receive a loaf of bread each at Toledo.—March 23, 1908.

"At Camden, N. J., a riot follows application of 1,500 men for 300 jobs advertised by the Joseph Campbell Company.—Aug. 10, 1908.

"Loan of \$9,000,000 to provide funds for public work asked by city of Philadelphia for unemployed; race riot followed demonstration of unemployed; Italians attacked by other nationalities.—March 15, 1908.

"Yes, those were happy Roosevelt days! Have you forgotten them?"

Just the other day, the state treasurer made a report covering the last two years, showing that the cost of running the state government had increased \$2,598,641. The expenditures in the last fiscal year far exceeded the receipts, and where there was a balance of \$1,379,827.81 a year ago, to-day there is only a balance of \$737,860.32. Gov. Clarke and the Republican state administration must stand the responsibility for this condition. Taxes have been raised, but in spite of this the extravagant state government has piled up expenses so high that, if continued, the state's surplus would be wiped out and the state would be plunged in debt. The annual corn crop of Iowa is worth more than the annual yield of either iron ore, anthracite coal, petroleum products, or the products of all the gold, silver, or copper mines of the United States.

Iowa farm property is valued at \$3,745,000,000.

Iowa farmers own machinery valued at \$95,447,000.

Value of Iowa cattle, \$118,864,000.

Value of Iowa horses, \$7,551,000.

Value of Iowa swine, \$69,693,000.

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RAILROAD MEN SAY VOTE IS FOR STRIKE

Assert Confidently Men Will Go to Extremes.

Chicago, July 14.—The result of a vote of locomotive engineers and firemen employed by ninety-eight railroads west of Chicago to determine whether they will strike to enforce their demand for a wage increase will be made known at a meeting between the general managers' committee of the railroads and representatives of the men.

It was asserted confidently by railroad men that the employes have voted to sustain their representatives to the extent of a strike if necessary. Warren S. Stone, grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and W. S. Carter, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, who have appeared for the employes, are in hopes that the result of the vote will induce the general managers' committee to reconsider its refusal of the demands and to reopen negotiations with the men.

Should this hope prove groundless it was said the government might be asked to mediate under the Erdman act before a strike is ordered. The total mileage of the roads involved is 140,000 and includes practically all lines in the United States west of Chicago, including the Illinois Central and all lines in Canada west of Fort William except the Grand Trunk Pacific. The number of engineers and firemen involved is about 55,000 and present annual wage is about \$67,750,000.

FOUR COMPANIES INDICTED

Roads and Coal Corporation Face Fines Exceeding \$1,000,000.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 14.—Indictments were filed in the United States district court at Rochester against the Pennsylvania railroad, the Northern Central railroad, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad company and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Coal company.

All the indictments relate to transactions in connection with the mining of anthracite coal in the Pennsylvania fields and transportation to Buffalo and vicinity and allege unfair advantages by the railroads over other shippers.

The four companies are liable to fines of more than a million dollars if convictions are had.

MANUFACTURER RAPS MOVIES

Nathaniel Stone, representing a large department store, believed that palm gardens and dance halls are all right when properly conducted.

Oscar Greenwald, another department store representative, said that department store girls are the most moral of any class of working girls.
