OBITUARY.

CARVER.

Chester M. Carver was born in Stockbridge, Madison county, N. Y., March 16, 1828. He was the seventh son of Austin and Peggy Carver, both descendants of sturdy New England ancestry.

In the spring of 1856, actuated by the spirit of progress and adventure, he left New York for the west intending to try his fortunes in Kansas.

In April 1856 he bought a preemption claim to a quarter section in Howard county, Iowa, located between what was at that time the villages of New Oregon and Vernon Springs.

In the summer of 1860, he, with his brother-in-law, R. W. Beadle, and a cousin from the east, left by mule team overland for Pikes Peak.

Removing to Cresco in the fall of 1871, he engaged for several years in various lines of business, being associated at one time with the late C. I. White, and afterwards with Capt. C. V. Jacobs in the lumber business.

Mr. Carver experienced religion in his early manhood, and altho not a member of any church, always lived a clean, consistent Christian life.

He is survived by his loving life companion, his youngest sister, Dora Carver, and his daughter, Mrs. Dora Swenson; a son, Charles Austin Carver, having died in infancy.
