The Royal Gwent Welsh Singers Coming to Cresco.

Theatre goers and music lovers who heard the Welsh Mountain Ash Choir some years ago will greet with pleasure the announcement that Manager Burgess has secured the famous Gwent Male Chorus for a concert on October 29th.

The fame of Welsh choral singing became world wide when in 1872 a mixed choir consisting mainly of Welsh village folk, under the leadership of Caradog (Griffith Rhys Jones) won the Crystal Palace Company's \$5,500 challenge trophy and a cash prize of \$500. This fame was enhanced in the following year, when the same choir under the same leader again won the trophy, beating the London choir, known then as the Paris Prize Choir, under the leadership of Mr. Proudman. The sons of the principality have ever since maintained the fame and ever enhanced the standard established and set by the Crystal Palace victories.

Of all the Welsh musical organizations, the Royal Gwent Welsh Singers has been the first and foremost, not only to maintain the fame, but to set a standard to Welsh or any other choral singing that has never yet been excelled.

The Royal Welsh Gwent Singers stands—and sings—before the world today as the unsurpassed organization of its kind, and incidentally, as the standard bearer through all lands of the superiority of the Welsh nation as a nation of singers. AUTO RACES FOR DECORAH.

Professional Drivers Will be Seen at Fair Grounds Oct. 22d and 23d.

The Motor Car Racing Association of Illinois will conduct auto races on the Decorah track, and the dates have been set for Friday and Saturday, Oct. 22d and 23d. The Motor Car Racing Association has conducted the most successful races in the middle west for the past 3 years and have a following of the best known and most popular cars and drivers in the business today. Among them are: The famous Duesenberg, No. 1, which averaged 99.6 miles per hour on the Omaha Speedway, driven by "Billy" Chandler; the 100 h. p. Chicago Stutz, No. 5, driven by Fay Carter; the National "Bullet" driven by "Dare Devil" Jordan the California road race demon; the popular little Buick "Bob Cat" with Eddie Lyons at the wheel; the big 200 h. p. Burman Special, which Bob Burman drove in the Vanderbilt Cup Race at San Francisco this spring now owned and piloted by Earl Day the well known young speed king; and the big 150 h. p. Staver "Brute" which won the Elgin race in 1912 driven by Gus Monckmeier.

Everyone of these men are attractions in themselves and these races should not be classed with small race meets, which attract only amateur racers. The Decorah track is a good one, and with such a fast bunch of entries, lovers of good, clean, thrilling sport will see some mighty fast and exciting races.

The cars have already begun to arrive and have attracted considerable attention being pulled down the streets of Decorah.

There will be four races each day for the big cars, the feature to be a 24 mile race, and a local stock car race. One thousand dollars will be offered in prizes, besides a special purse for a new track record, for one mile, now held by Louis Disbrow, time one minute 9 1/5 seconds.

The largest crowd in the history of this section is anticipated and the races will undoubtedly attract a great number from here.

The general admission is 50c with no extra charge for cars to enter the grounds.
