We are enjoying beautiful autumn weather. Apples are being harvested and shipped by the car load. Returns from the products of this valley are much greater than those of last year. People throughout the whole Northwest are much encouraged and more hopeful than for a few years past. Prosperity is rather slow in reaching our coast. Flowers are in abundance with us yet. Potatoes and all root vegetables are still in the ground. Pastures are green. Oregon with its mild climate and rich resources is good enough for us. Mr. Isbell is an apple inspector in the Apple Growers' Association in town and goes there each morning, while I care for the duties on our ranch.


Congregational Church.
